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Graff to Report that the Schools Are Overcrowded

That seven public schools in the city are crowded beyond capacity and in violation of law will be declared by Superintendent E. U. Graff in a report to the Board of Education Monday night.

So crowded are some of the schools that single sessions are being held and even at this the congestion is still so great that school work is impeded.

"Still there is no remedy now," said Superintendent Graff. "We cannot solve the problem immediately. The report I will make merely sets forth the facts."

Members of the teachers' and instruction committee have been considering the crowded condition of public schools, but no recommendations have been prepared owing to the reported shortage of school district funds.

Arrangements will be made to continue the summer vacation schools this year, which will, in a way, tend to alleviate conditions, as pupils will be permitted to make up back work or take advance studies during vacation.
