To Name Committees—The various standing committees of the Commercial club are to be made up at the meeting of the executive committee Tuesday noon. The chairman of most of the standing committees for the coming year were named a week ago. Fire Damages Home—Fire starting from a defective fuse did a damage estimated at \$100 to the home of Elmer Deck, 194 South Twenty-ninth street. The loss was confined principally to the roof of the dwelling and a rear upper room. No one was hurt. Troops for Philippines—A special train carrying 200 soldiers went west over the Burlington Sunday night. The men are en route from Columbus barracks to San Francisco, from whence they are to take ship for the Philippines to take the place of troops who will be brought back to the states. Robinsons Home Property—B. H. Robinson has sold to W. M. Jackson a number of pieces of city property for a consideration of \$20,000. The property includes a large brick house at Twenty-sixth street and Capitol avenue and a large frame house on the south side of Capitol avenue near the same corner. Henderson Being Sued—William J. Henderson, arrested Sunday night for creating a disturbance at the Salvation Army lodging house, Eleventh and Dodge streets, was found to corners top from \$1, \$5 and \$10 bills, when searched at police headquarters. The police are holding the man for investigation. Man Fined for Theft—W. T. and Caroline Reize, Midland hotel, were arraigned in police court, charged with the theft of a handbag from the Brandeis stores. Special Officer Finn appeared against the couple and testified as to having taken the bag from the man. Judge Foster allowed Caroline to go free and fined her husband \$5 and costs.

NOT AFRAID OF BLUE SKY LAW

Local Bond Brokers Satisfied that it is Constitutional. REGULATES THE SALE OF BONDS Makes it Necessary for Corporations Selling them to Give a Statement of the Company's Finances. Local bond brokers are of the opinion that there is nothing in the so-called blue sky law of Nebraska that will brand it as unconstitutional, in the light of the decision just rendered by the federal court at Detroit, Mich., issuing a temporary injunction against the operation of the blue sky law of that state. The decision there was based largely on the ground that the law is in violation of interstate commerce, in that it prevents the sale of bonds of outside investment companies in articles of commerce. The law in Michigan also undertakes to regulate the issue of stock and prevent such sales when the railway commission decides that a company is unreliable and unsound. The three judges who gave a unanimous decision in the Michigan case also pointed out that the restraint of interstate commerce is complete in the blue sky law as it stands, since it provides that a non-resident may not sell bonds of another state, however good they may be, for thirty days after offering them. No Time Limit Set. No thirty-day term is required by the blue sky law of Nebraska, which was passed by the last legislature. The Nebraska law states that a foreign corporation offering securities for sale in this state shall receive a permit from the State Railway commission after the railway commission has been satisfied as to the solvency of the concern, etc. It requires that with the application for a permit the corporation, person or firm shall file an itemized statement of financial condition and other information. If the company offering stocks or bonds in this state shall not have been in operation more than six months the application for permit shall so indicate on its face. If the agent is to be paid more than 10 per cent commission for selling the securities such fact shall be set forth on the face of the permit. Every company outside of the state on applying for permission to sell securities in this state must file a copy of the laws under which it is organized in its home state. These are some of the salient features of the Nebraska blue sky law. The law provides within itself also that if any court shall declare any section of the act unconstitutional, that decision shall apply to that section only, and that the rest of the law shall stand as valid.

ANOTHER PLUM RIFE FOR SOME WAITING DEMOCRAT.

A ruling made several years ago requires that the incumbent of the office continue to discharge his duties until a successor has qualified for the office. The expiration of the office of United States attorney leaves the democrats with three important federal positions to fill in Omaha, the terms of the internal revenue collector and the United States marshal having already expired.

KUGEL NOW HEADS POLICE

Issues Orders to Chief Dunn to "Strictly Enforce" Regulations. PROMISES HIS CO-OPERATION. Bouquets Given to Ryder—Kugel Receives Many Expressions of Good Will and the Hope He Will Succeed. Al C. Kugel, formerly street commissioner, taking charge of the police department today, issued written instructions to Chief of Police Henry W. Dunn to "strictly enforce" all police regulations and state laws in Omaha. Former Police Commissioner J. J. Ryder took charge of the street commissioner's department, the council having transferred the two officials at Ryder's request. Fifty friends of Ryder sent huge bunches of roses and cards of good wishes. Kugel received many expressions of good will and hopes that he would succeed as head of the police department. The transfer followed protests against the police department for non-enforcement of the laws. Kugel's orders to Chief Dunn follow: "I herewith outline the policy of this department for your future direction. I have announced through the public press that I believe in 'law enforcement.' With your aid and the force under your command, it is my intention to carry out this policy without fear or favor. I specifically call your attention to the illegal sales of liquors, houses of prostitution, assignment houses, gambling and pool halls. 'I direct you to put forth strenuous efforts to discover and prosecute any violation of the above mentioned offenses. You will always have my earnest and sincere co-operation at all times in carrying out this order.' Chief Dunn said he would carry out instructions to the letter. The committee of the Japanese Parliament last May made a favorable report on the proposed appropriation of \$260,000 for the representation of Japan at the exposition at San Francisco in 1915. In view of recent events in California, however, more definite action on the part of Japan has been awaited.

The former shah of Persia, Mohammed Ali Mirza, has arrived at St. Petersburg incognito. F. W. Vanderbilt's yacht Warrior, stranded off the coast of Colombia, is still hard aground, although apparently not seriously damaged. The national subscription for the French aerial war fleet amounts to \$1,382,000.
