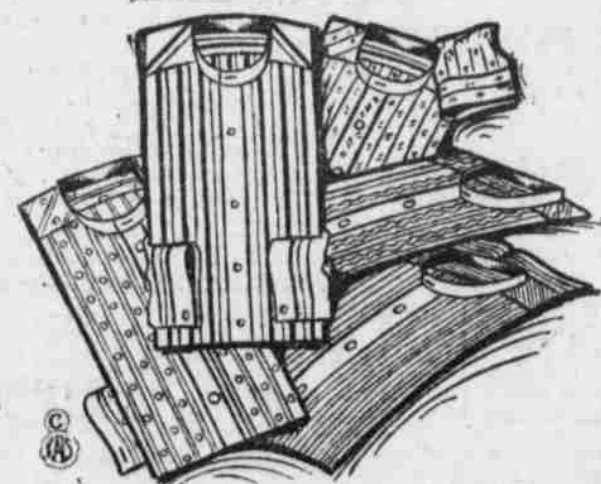

MATTERS GOES BEFORE JURY

Waives Rights to Give Testimony in Sutton Bank Case.

WANTS NO MISAPPREHENSION

Friends Say on His Behalf He Did Not Know of Matters in Indictment Until They Were Printed.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Neb., Feb. 6.—(Special Telegram)—Waiving all his constitutional rights, Thomas H. Matters, whose name was associated with the First National bank failure at Sutton, appeared before the grand jury this afternoon for the purpose of making a statement of the facts in relation to his connection with the bank. In his application Mr. Matters said:

I waive my constitutional right whereby I may refuse to give any testimony that would incriminate me and waive all rights and privileges which the law allows me or any other person being under investigation for the commission of any offense against the laws of the United States, fully realizing that if this request is granted I cannot be accompanied by counsel and that I subject myself to such cross-examination by you or either of you, Mr. Howell or Mr. Lane, or anyone lawfully authorized to assist you or by any member of the grand jury.

I agree that any statement I make under oath or otherwise, if permitted to go before the jury, whether in response or not, may be used against me as far as the law of prosecution allows.

which caused him to believe the statement made by the president that the bank was all right. It is said in his behalf that Mr. Matters knew nothing of the \$15,000 transaction mentioned in the indictment against Leubben until he read it in the published statement this morning. In all cases under the federal statutes there must be a fixed intention on the part of the person charged with the crime to defraud, and as Mr. Matters has never received a cent from the bank for any transaction with it and the bank has received 100 cents on the dollar in all cases in which he was connected, according to friends of Mr. Matters, it would seem that there was little ground for dishonesty on his part. It is expected that the case will consume several days longer.

Petition Filed for Sale of Paddock Hotel in Beatrice

BEATRICE, Neb., Feb. 6.—(Special.)—Hazlett & Jack, attorneys for mortgagees, filed in the district court Thursday a petition asking that a mortgage on the Paddock hotel property in this city be foreclosed and the property sold to satisfy the judgment; that a receiver be appointed during the pendency of the action to take possession of the property, collect the rents and apply the same to the payment of taxes, and upon the costs of this proceeding and the balance, if any, to be applied upon the amount decreed to be due the plaintiffs. The original mortgage was for \$25,000, about \$5,000 of which is still due. The petition asks that E. P. Mumford of this city be appointed receiver.

Mrs. Zessin was Miss Augusta Buettner and was born in Germany in 1864, October 12, 1874, she was married to Albert Zessin at Norfolk, Neb., who survives her, also two sons, Edward and Fred, and one daughter, Emma, all of this city. She is also survived by two brothers and two sisters, August and Martin Buettner and Mrs. Hexenstein of Madison, and Mrs. Mary Donath of Fort Collins, Colo. The deceased and family resided in Omaha
