The sale amounted to about \$75,000.

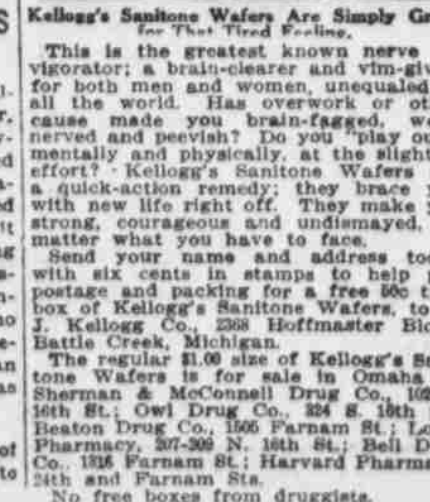

BEECH CAMP AGAINST RATES

Instructs Delegates to Work for the Repeal of Chicago Schedule.

ARE PLEDGED TO JOHN S. KING

"Administration" Candidate Secures Endorsement by Small Margin After Opposition Makes Split Fight.

Beech camp, No. 164, Modern Woodmen of America, last night chose its delegates to the county camp, which meets at South Omaha. Before the delegates were adopted, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, An honest difference of opinion exists as to the manner in which the rate question should be settled, some of the members being in favor of the so-called adequate rate, and some in favor of no change, but all loyal members recognize that some compromise plan should be adopted; therefore be it

Resolved, That the delegates and alternates elected to the county camp are instructed to favor, work and vote for an increase of our present rates of assessment at the age of entry, but in no event to exceed 60 per cent, with twelve assessments each year; be it further

Resolved, That the delegates are instructed to work favor and vote for the repeal of the Chicago rates.

An amendment to change the first resolution so as to instruct the delegates to work for amendments to the general laws of the organization and to leave the matter of fixing rates to be determined by the Toledo road camp was voted down by 35 to 23.

Goethals Entrusted With Organization of the Canal Force

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—Organization of the permanent force of officials and employes to operate the Panama canal has been entrusted to Colonel George W. Goethals, who becomes first governor of the canal April 1. Under an order by President Wilson, issued at the request of Secretary Garrison, and made public today, Colonel Goethals is authorized to make appointments and fix salaries, exercising his own judgment as to the force needed. It is estimated that the number of men will be about 2,500.

The only exceptions to the new governor's right of appointment are in the cases of the district judge, the district attorney and the clerk of the court.

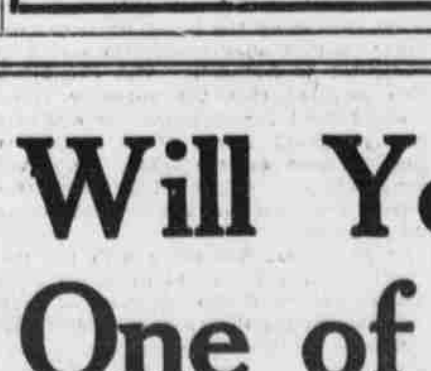

COST OF TWELVE FOOD STAPLES Up 49.6 Per Cent in Ten Years

The average per cent of increase on twelve staple articles of food in the past ten years in Chicago has been 49.6, according to a table presented to the Municipal Markets Commission by their chairman, Alderman James H. Lawley. This is the table, showing that the wage earner paid nearly 50 per cent more for food in 1913 than in 1903.
