C. C. Rosewater Makes Annual Report of Publicity Body.

GIVES MUCH INFORMATION

Commercial Club Disseminates Columns of News to the World in Behalf of Omaha's Advantages.

Each week of the year the bureau of publicity of the Commercial club sends news matter concerning activities in Omaha and the state to 837 newspapers of the state. Also it answered over 1,000 independent letters on inquiry for information concerning Omaha in the last year.

The report points out that the bureau works for the interest of Omaha and the state. It calls attention to the work done by the bureau in circulating the news and pictures of the rebuilding of Omaha after the tornado; the efforts of the bureau in securing the publication of booster editions of several hundred newspapers throughout the state which set forth the resources and activities of Nebraska.
