MUST SECURE NEW LOCATION

State Epileptic Colony Not to Be Placed Near Des Moines.

DEAL WITH INTERURBAN FAILS

State Printer and Pharmacy Board Plan to Publish All Who Had Hand in Sale of Examination Papers.

(From a Staff Correspondent.)

DES MOINES, Ia., Feb. 9.—(Special Telegram.)—The State Board of Control today reopened the matter of location of the state epileptic colony. A proposal had been made to buy a tract of land near Des Moines for \$200,000 on condition that the interurban line would be extended there. Today the owners of the land reported that it had been impossible to make the deal with the owners of the interurban system. Probably a new location will be secured in some distant part of the state.

To Make Public Examples.

A conference between the state printer and the pharmacy board was held today and it was decided upon prompt prosecution of all the persons connected with the deal whereby examination papers stolen from the state printing office were used by students to prepare for the examination. Three men are under arrest and a dozen more will be.

Cold Weather a Good Thing.

The fruit growers and farmers of the state are saying that the cold weather which has suddenly come is a good thing for the state of Iowa. The last few days of January were so warm there was really great danger of frost starting the sap and causing irreparable loss. Now the cold weather and the snow has made it certain there will be no thawing out until late in the spring. The reports indicate that what winter wheat in the fields has not suffered materially because of the open winter, because there have been no storms and no wind to blow the dirt from the roots of the plants. The ground is very dry, however, and a late spring would mean poor condition of the soil of Iowa as to moisture content.

Coal Miners and Machinery.

Coal miners of Iowa are much interested in experiments under way at some of the mines in the southern part of the state to determine the value of machinery for drilling in mines. At the Myrtle mine a Sullivan mining machine has been in use some time and one has just been installed at the Midland mine in Marion county. WOLF HUNT IN KANSAS CITY

Half Starved Animal Killed on Boulevard After Exciting Chase.

THREE PERSONS ARE ATTACKED

Police Are Unable to Account for Presence of Wild Beast in One of the Most Fashionable Sections of the City.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Feb. 9.—A large half-starved gray wolf, after biting two persons, frightening a score of others and spreading consternation through a staid and fashionable south side residence district, was shot and killed on Linwood boulevard here today. The wolf sprang upon Miss Anna Harrison as she waited for a street car. Miss Harrison screamed, threw her fur muff at the animal and while the miff was being torn to shreds escaped into a house. Her clothing was torn, but she was unhurt. The wolf ran down the boulevard pursued by a milkman, who hurled bottles as he ran. Two blocks from the scene of the first attack the wolf snapped at a negro domestic, causing a painful wound in the arm. A number of grocery boys, business men and servants from boulevard homes joined the chase. A riot call was sent along the headquarters and an automobile with a half dozen patrolmen hurried to the scene. The wolf had run fifteen blocks and attacked another pedestrian, Samuel J. Harnden, a deputy county collector, before T. W. Wight, a policeman, ended the chase by sending a bullet into the animal's head. The police pronounced the "kill" a fine specimen of the gray wolf, but were at a loss to know how it found its way into the heart of the residence district.

Villa Gives Pledge to Protect Spanish Subjects in Battle

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—After an hour's conference with President Wilson at the White House tonight, Secretary Bryan announced that assurances had been received from General Francisco Villa of his intention to protect Spanish subjects when he attacked Torreon. Word also was received from the constitutionalist general of his intention to assist in fixing the responsibility for the tragedy at Cumbre tunnel, on the Mexican Northwestern railroad, in which several Americans were suffocated. General Villa has complied with the request of the State department that a guard of soldiers accompany the party, composed mostly of Americans, who intend to recover the bodies. Secretary Bryan said he had ordered American Consul Edwards at Juarez to send a special messenger with the party to report on the affair. Constitutionalists here say Maximo Castillo, who is charged with responsibility for the tunnel accident, is an irresponsible bandit with a small following, recognizing neither Huerta nor Carranza. He was the trusted bodyguard of Madero when the latter took the field against Diaz and members of the constitutionalist agency here claim his present outlawry is the result of insanity. They say he will be summarily dealt with by Villa if captured.

World Grows Better, Says Speaker Clark to Big Mass Meeting

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—Speaker Champ Clark told a Christian Endeavor mass meeting today that the world was growing better every day. He said the reason many people took a gloomy view of the times was because the telegraph enabled newspapers nowadays to chronicle the crimes and disasters of all the world within a few hours. The speaker asserted that nothing made him madder than to hear people say that public men of the present day were corrupt. The people's representatives in Washington, he said, were "non-act, conscientious servants." Ninety per cent of the men sent to congress, he added, leave poorer than they come, although they could acquire fortunes by stooping to dishonesty. Discussing the hardships resulting from a having several struggling churches in a single small town, Mr. Clark said he hoped some day to see his own church, the Christian, or Campbellite, and the Baptist one great denomination. Their beliefs, he said, were near enough the same to warrant them in joining hands.

Ferris Declines to Attend the Inquiry Into Copper Strike

HANCOCK, Mich., Feb. 9.—A letter from Governor W. N. Ferris declining an invitation to attend the congressional investigation of the copper strike was made public today by Chairman Taylor at the opening session of the inquiry. "EXECUTIVE CHAMBER, Lansing, Mich., Feb. 4.—My Dear Sir: Your letter of February 3 is before me. I have never made a comprehensive report of the strike situation. Immediately after the strike was called C. E. Mahoney and Angus Kerr came to the executive office. Either immediately preceding their call or immediately after they called I offered my services to the miners and mine operators by way of mediation. This was declined by the mine operators. "From time to time other delegations came to the executive office. Later on Mr. Meyer of the Western Federation of Miners and Clarence Darrow of Chicago had a conference with me. At another time representatives of labor organizations in the state of Michigan called on me. At another time a delegation of five or six miners waited on me. At another time Mitchell and Mahon of Detroit and Clarence Darrow waited on me. At another time James McLaughlin, manager of the Calumet and Hecla, waited on me. The clergy and other representatives have from time to time come to the office to tell me how to settle the strike. "In January I visited the copper country and made investigations with reference to specific points. During the last three months the results of all my investigations have been reported to me. I have also had complete stenographic reports of the Mahon and Darrow conferences. I have also a complete stenographic report of my investigations in the copper country. I regret that I cannot find in my files the typewritten report of Judge Murphy, who, as my representative, spent two weeks in the copper country early in the strike, trying to serve as mediator. "As I view the situation, I cannot afford to go to the copper country again, nor can I afford to send the attorney general unless the United States government demands it. Any information at my office is at your disposal. I prefer, however, that your committee wait upon me at this office. You will go to the copper country first, get whatever information you can, then come prepared to see me at a time which will be agreeable to both parties and ascertain what I have in store for you."

Mrs. Anton H. Shimerda. WILBER, Neb., Feb. 9.—(Special.)—Mrs. Anton H. Shimerda died at St. Joseph's hospital, Omaha, early Sunday morning, after several operations had been performed. She was the wife of the county assessor of Saline county and the mother of three sons, Frank, Anton and Fred, all grown. Her husband is confined in the hospital with rheumatism. The funeral will be held here Tuesday.

Mrs. Mary L. Tucker. LYON, Neb., Feb. 9.—(Special.)—Mrs. Mary L. Tucker died here at the home of her daughter, Mrs. C. A. Darling, aged 76 years. The body was taken to Yankton today and laid to rest beside that of her husband, who died a number of years ago. They were old pioneer settlers of this county.

Residence in Yankton Burned. YANKTON, S. D., Feb. 9.—(Special Telegram.)—The modern and palatial residence of DeWitt Smith on James river was completely destroyed by fire at 1 o'clock this morning. Mr. Smith, wife and two small children escaped from a bedroom window in their night clothes, with the house in full flame around them. The loss is \$15,000, partially covered by insurance.

Rev. Jenks Fights Blaze in Home, Then Goes to His Church

Just as Rev. Edwin Bart Jenks, D. D., pastor of the First Presbyterian church, was ready to leave his home, 3545 Capitol avenue, for church Sunday morning a water pipe in the furnace of the house burst and threw live coals all over the basement, starting a fire. The minister extinguished the flames with the aid of his sons, Chester and Hart, and the fire department's chemical extinguisher and then hurried to church in time to open the services on time. No one was hurt and the damage done was confined to the basement of the pastor's home. Members of the congregation noticed that Rev. Dr. Jenks' face was rather dusky while he was preaching. The water in his home had been turned off when the pipe burst and the nearness of the church hour forced him to hasten at once to the pulpit. However, nobody knew he had been through a fire till he told the elders after the service.

County Superintendent Snow is working hard for consolidation and the indications are that before fall there will be half a dozen consolidated school districts in Hamilton county.
