Fighters Are Fined—George Berge and Arnold Wolf were each fined \$5 and costs in police court on a charge of disturbing the peace at the Douglas Auditorium. Both are students and engaged in fistfights as a result of an argument.

Sign Ordinance Put Over—An ordinance prohibiting huge electric and other signs used for advertising purposes was read at the meeting of the city commission in committee of the whole and action was postponed until March 2 at the request of merchants.

To Tax Sidewalk Space—An ordinance providing for a tax on space occupied by merchants and others above sidewalks as well as subway space was recommended for passage by the city commission in committee of the whole.

Consider Junk Yards—An ordinance ordering the removal of junk yards from residential districts was referred to the commissioner of public improvements by the council in committee of the whole. The commissioner of public improvements will report on the advisability of passing such a measure.

Gillin to Collect Income Tax—Ross L. Hammond, collector of internal revenue for the district of Nebraska, has received notice of the appointment of John J. Gillin of South Omaha as deputy collector of internal revenue at a salary of \$1,500 a year and traveling expenses. Mr. Gillin will be assigned to field work in the administration of the income tax. Mr. Gillin is a democrat and for several years was city treasurer of South Omaha.

To Investigate Poles on Streets—City Commissioners J. J. Ryder and Thomas McGovern have been appointed a committee to investigate the complaints of resident property owners along Twenty-fourth, Lake and Corby streets who say telephone and telegraph poles are "eyesores" and dangerous, being in the middle of narrow sidewalks. The council has been considering the passage of an ordinance ordering the poles along these streets removed.

Woman Arrested on Charge of Enticing Two Young Girls

Mrs. Louisa Meserve, an aged woman who appears to be at least 60 years of age, was arrested by Officer George Emory, charged with aiding and abetting the delinquency of two young girls, Ada Price, aged 15, and Minnie Price, aged 15, both of Dunlap, Ia. All three parties will be turned over to the juvenile authorities for the trial of the old woman.

The two Price girls came to Omaha to see their father, who is alleged to be in the city, and while roaming the streets in a vain hunt for him they encountered this woman, who won herself into their confidence. She managed to extract \$20 in cash which they happened to have on their persons, but she was not content with that, so she compelled them to solicit on the streets. They attracted the attention of Emory, to whom they told their tale, and Emory instantly arrested the woman. She gives her address as the 'Flomar hotel at Seventeenth and Capitol avenue.

The oldest Price girl, Ada, is engaged to be married to a farmer near Dunlap.

Superintendent Carson is Pleased with Kugel's Regime.

SEES REAL WAVE OF REFORM

Says the Best Thing Which Has Been Done is the Stopping of the Sale of Liquor at the Dahlman Club.

"The most significant thing that Police Commissioner Kugel has done up to this time is the stopping of the liquor selling at the Dahlman Club," said Superintendent H. F. Carson of the State Anti-Saloon league when in Omaha today. "It is important because a club that is composed almost entirely of office seekers should be above the violation of the laws of the state in which they live." Superintendent Carson said he was well pleased with the way the new police commissioner is handling the affairs of the police department. "So far it looks good, and we are well pleased," he said. "If Commissioner Kugel only keeps up the

work it will be all right. He deserves a good deal of praise for what he has already done."

Anti-Saloon league officials feel that the policemen of Omaha forbidden to take drink while on duty, with the mail carriers warned by Postmaster Wharton not to "frequent saloons which are looked down upon by all good citizens," and with the Dahlman club ordered to quit selling liquor, a wave of "sure enough" reform has struck Omaha.

Retailers to Hold National Meeting

A national association of secretaries of various business associations, especially the associated retailers of the various large cities, is to be formed in St. Louis on Monday, February 23. J. W. Motcaille, secretary of the Associated Retailers of Omaha, is the man who called the meeting. He felt the need of a national organization where the problems of the secretaries of such organizations might be thrashed out. He issued the call January 2. Already secretaries from some twenty-five cities in the United States, extend-

ing from coast to coast, have accepted the invitation. Mr. Motcaille will leave for St. Louis probably next Friday evening.
