Shiphoad of Black Men Ready to Start for Africa.

NOW WAITING FOR LEADER

Alfred C. Sam, Who Says He is an Ashantee Chief, Collected Large Sums in Oklahoma for Passage Money.

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—A shiphoad of negroes, mostly farmers and their wives from Oklahoma, waited here today for Alfred C. Sam to lead them to a new negro Utopia on the Gulf coast of Africa. The colored farmers were induced to come here, they said, by Sam, who had been collecting colonizers from Oklahoma, Texas and Mississippi. More negroes were expected from Galveston and the west, and it was said that eighty-six were coming from Boston.

PANAMA, Feb. 10.—Colonel George W. Goethals, chairman of the Panama canal commission, today suspended John Burke, manager of the commissary department.

Colonel Goethals also suspended W. P. Shipley, chief clerk of the commissary department, the reason given being "incompetency."

W. F. Baxter Believes Omaha Stands Good Chance.

THANKS FOR SUPPLY DEPOT

Victor Rosewater Visits in Washington and is Received by President Wilson, Being Introduced by Mr. Bryan.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—(Special Telegram.)—W. F. Baxter of Omaha, a delegate to the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, from the Commercial club, today in company with Congressman Loebek called on General Aleshire of the quartermaster's corps to thank him for the order issued by his department in relation to the supply depot at Omaha. He also paid his respects to Secretary Garrison and Judge Advocate General Crowder. Tomorrow he hopes to meet the Nebraska delegation at luncheon, Representative Loebek having issued invitations for the occasion, and talk to the Nebraskans, in behalf of a regional bank at Omaha, which he confidently believes is possible of accomplishment.

Victor Rosewater in Washington

Since he arrived in Washington yesterday Mr. Baxter has been doing yeoman work in behalf of the Gate City, which, he says, is ideally situated for a regional bank. Colorado and Utah bankers having endorsed the proposition for a regional bank in Omaha, in preference to Kansas City, he cannot see how the reserve bank could locate a bank at St. Louis and Kansas City, and is imbued with the idea that if the delegation gets behind the movement for Omaha it may be brought about.

MOTHER DIES, SUICIDE PACT

F. C. Billings Faces Tragedy When He Comes Home for Noon Meal.

TWO CHILDREN STILL LIVING

Boy Regains Consciousness and Tells that He Purchased Drug Which Mother, Sister and Himself Swallowed.

What is thought by the police to be a suicide pact was uncovered this noon by F. C. Billings, 410 North Twenty-fifth avenue, when he came home for his noon day meal and found his wife dead and two children dying. The doors of the house were locked and the window shades drawn down, and thinking that rather unusual, the father broke in the front door and entered. In the living room was the prostrate body of his step-son, Clarence Shuman, aged 20 years, and in the kitchen was his wife sitting in a chair, dead. In her arms was their little 2 1/2-year-old boy, La Roy, unconscious.

Woman Leaps from Roof of Skyscraper

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Feb. 10.—While hundreds of shoppers passed in the street, not thirty feet away, a fashionable dressed woman about 30 years old, leaped from the roof of the R. A. Long building, a fifteen-story structure in the downtown district today, and was dashed to death on the cobblestones of the alley in the rear of the building.

Woman Leaps from Roof of Skyscraper

Persons in an office in a neighboring high building saw the woman climb to the parapet, pause a moment, clasp her hands and dive off head first. The body was identified this afternoon as that of Miss Elna Zimmerman, a stenographer employed by an implement company here. At the house where Miss Zimmerman roomed it was said that she had always shown despondency for weeks, but had confided in no one. She had attempted to take her life before by swallowing poison, it was said.

Tug Patomac Carried Out to Sea by Ice
