

NATIONAL MAKES SCHEDULE

Big League Will Open Season April 14 and Close October 7.

ONLY FOUR CONFLICTING DATES

Western Clubs Have Slight Advantage in the Distribution of Holiday and Sunday Games.

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—The 1914 playing schedule of the National League as announced here tonight, following the annual meeting of the schedule committee, calls for the opening of the season on Tuesday, April 14, and the final game on October 7. According to a notice accompanying the schedule no changes shall be made that will conflict with the American league playing dates, and double-headers shall not be scheduled for conflicting dates except by the consent of President Johnson of the American league. An exception to this ruling is made on the final trip of the season, to be exercised only in the case of absolute necessity. There are but four conflicting dates, however, all of which occur in Chicago, these being May 19, 21, July 2 and September 12.

In the distribution of home holiday and Saturday dates, these schedule plans are about evenly apportioned, although the western clubs have a slight advantage over their eastern rivals. Pittsburgh draws fifteen Saturdays and three holiday dates; Chicago, fourteen Saturdays, eleven Saturdays and two holidays; St. Louis secures eleven Sundays, ten Saturdays and one holiday, and Cincinnati has fifteen Sundays and ten Saturdays. In the east Boston has thirteen Saturdays and three holiday dates; Philadelphia thirteen Saturdays and two holidays; New York and Brooklyn share alike, each being allotted fourteen Saturdays and one holiday.

The road schedule shows that Cincinnati has fifteen Saturdays, two Sundays and three holidays; Chicago fourteen Saturdays, three Sundays and two holidays; St. Louis, fifteen Saturdays, six Sundays and two holidays; New York, eleven Saturdays, five Sundays and two holidays; Brooklyn receives a similar share; Pittsburgh, ten Saturdays and ten Sundays; and Philadelphia twelve Saturdays, five Sundays and one holiday.

EVERS WON'T RUN THE CUBS

His Place to Be Taken by Henry O'Day, it is Asserted.

OUSTED MANAGER MAY JOIN FED

Differences Between Him and Murphy Have Existed Since Middle of Last Season—Will Leave Big Hole at Second.

CHICAGO, Feb. 10.—Johnny Evers will not be manager of the Chicago National league club this year, according to a statement given out in Charles W. Murphy's office here today. It was said that Evers will be succeeded by Henry O'Day, umpire and former manager of the Cincinnati club. Murphy's statement bore a New York date line, but evidently was written in the Cub office here and "released" early this evening in a telegram which Murphy sent to Secretary Thomas. The statement gave no reason for the change in managers, other than saying that O'Day had made a good showing with the Cincinnati club in 1912. Differences between Murphy and Evers have existed since the middle of last season. The loss of the city series to the White Sox last fall was blamed on Evers by Murphy, who thought good base ball judgment on the part of the Cubs' manager would have given them the winners' edge.

Blamed Evers for Loss. That Murphy made up his mind some time ago to make a change in leadership is believed by certain persons close to base ball affairs here. They think that Joe Tinker was decided upon as leader by Murphy if he could have persuaded Garry Herrmann and the rest of the Cincinnati club directors to give him the shortstop instead of Brooklyn. Although Evers out as manager, he was not released from the club so far as is known, but his friends here are divided on the question of whether or not he will continue to play ball with the Cubs. It is said that Evers would be willing to join the Federal league, should it offer sufficient inducements.

Ever's absence from the Cub line up would make a rather serious hole at second base if it were argued, since Al Bridwell, shortstop, has jumped to the Federals. Murphy has, however, a number of good young infielders. O'Day actually began work as manager for the Cubs last month, when he signed Jimmy Johnston, the outfielder, who was holding out over a difference in salary.

O'Day began his base ball career as a pitcher, and later became one of the foremost umpires, an authority on the rules and a strict disciplinarian. In 1912 he succeeded Clark Griffith as manager of Cincinnati, but after a brilliant start his team fell back and he quit at the end of the year, resuming his old position as umpire. Evers has been with the Cubs about twelve years. He was a main cog in the old Cub machine, in which the double play "Tinker to Evers to Chance" became famous, and was known as an advanced student of "inside ball."
