WILL SIZE UP SOME SHOWS

O'Brien and Weaver to Look Over Attractions for Ak-Sar-Ben.

MANAGERS MEET AT CHICAGO

Those Who Run Carnival Companies to Have Convention at Windy City for Purpose of Signing Contracts.

J. O'Brien, member of the board of governors of Ak-Sar-Ben, and Secretary J. D. Weaver of the same organization are to start for Chicago Tuesday evening of next week, where they are to attend a meeting of the secretaries of state fairs, carnivals and annual festivals, with regard to selecting the talent and shows for the coming fall festivals. Managers of the big carnival companies of the country are to be present at the meeting and some contracts are likely to be signed before the meeting is over. The idea in getting the secretaries together at such a meeting is to consider jointly the selection of shows for the carnivals, so that convenient circuits can be arranged for the various shows and carnival companies. When a carnival company can be engaged to show at a large number of fall festivals not too far distant, that company can save a great deal of railroad fare and expenses in eliminating the big jumps. This always means that the carnival companies can be engaged on more favorable percentages. Following the two days' meeting at Chicago Mr. O'Brien will come back to Omaha, while Mr. Weaver will go on to Terre Haute, Ind., thence to Columbus, O. Both Terre Haute and Columbus have had successful "homecoming" weeks in the past in connection with their fall festivals, and Secretary Weaver will talk over plans and programs with them with a view to absorbing some new ideas for the "homecoming" week that is planned in connection with Ak-Sar-Ben week for this fall.

T. E. Brady, attorney for Mrs. Nellie R. Paul, who is suing Arthur Brandeis for \$50,000 in Judge Day's district court, charged attorneys W. J. Connell and John C. Wharton, who represent Mr. Brandeis, with shaking hands with members of the jury and talking to them, in a complaint to the court.

Postmaster Wharton admitted that he shook hands with two or three jurors, and Connell also admitted it, but they both seemed to think the fact that they did the handshaking in the court room when the judge was on the bench excused them. The charges made some merriment and served to enliven the course of the trial, but were finally allowed to drop.

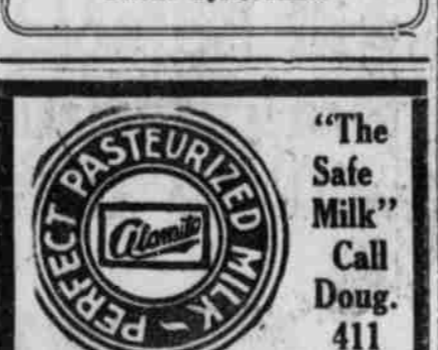
