Reading of depositions taken in Kansas City and Detroit indicating that Clarence Rialley, son of Mrs. Nellie Paul, who is suing Arthur Brandeis for \$25,000 in Judge Day's district court, has been of immoral character for several years, continued the morning session of court and part of Wednesday afternoon. Local witnesses testified in the afternoon session. Reading of the depositions was begun after the plaintiff rested her case. Both sides reserved the right to recall Rialley to the stand for further questioning.

Start Big Suit for Fire Loss Against Union Pacific Today

Suit against the Union Pacific Railroad company to recover \$20,000 fire loss is to be started today, February 13, in district court at Papillion by the Waldron Seed company of Waterloo, Neb. The seed company's warehouse at Waterloo was burned March 15 last. It is charged that the fire was started by a spark from a passing Union Pacific engine. The insurance was paid by the five companies in which the place was insured. The insurance companies are the Aetna of Hartford, the Fidelity Phoenix of New York, the American Central of St. Louis, the State Insurance company of Pennsylvania, and the Alliance Insurance company of Pennsylvania. The five insurance companies are joining with the seed company in starting the suit.

Judge E. M. Stenberg Dies at Benson Home from Heart Trouble

Judge E. M. Stenberg, Swedish consul in Omaha for the last twenty-five years, died yesterday at his home in Benson with heart failure. He was born at Costa, Sweden, in 1848, and left for America when he was 20 years of age. In 1870 he came to Omaha and entered the employ of the Union Pacific Railroad company and six years later was appointed a justice of the peace. He was elected judge of the police court in 1886 and served in that capacity for a number of years. From 1902 to 1908 he was a county commissioner and since then has lived a rather retired life. King Olof of Sweden knighted him into the Royal Order of Wasara in 1904, for valuable services he performed for the nation at the time of the famine.

Funeral of Judge Alstadt Yesterday

Scores of Omahans, young and old, prosperous and poor, but all true and honest friends of the late Justice of the Peace William Alstadt, gathered at the late home of the popular "Little Bismarck" at 192 South Sixteenth street, to attend the last services before "Der Cludger" was laid to rest, where the trials and troubles of a justice of a peace will never be forgotten. Wednesday the body lay in state at the undertaking parlors of Hulse & Riepen. Many friends who found themselves unable to attend the funeral services called at the undertaking parlors to pay respects to the little German who made so much history in Nebraska and Omaha.

Irish Societies to Give Joint Banquet

Members of the Emmet Monument association and Irish Fellowship club will give their joint banquet this year on Tuesday, March 3, at the Commercial club. The banquet is given to commemorate the life and work of Robert Emmet. Especial significance attaches to the event this year because of the outlook that home rule for Ireland may become a fact within the next few months, the goal for which Emmet gave up his life.

GRAND JURY INVESTIGATES LABOR AGENCY LICENSES

Charges that some local employment agencies have been favored by being allowed to operate without paying the yearly license of \$10 required by city ordinance are under consideration by the grand jury sitting at the court house. Half a dozen witnesses have been called to testify concerning the dispute, including David Berkowitz, city license inspector, and James H. Davies, proprietor of an employment agency.
