CALLS SALOONS NECESSITY

Mine Operator Tells of Sale of Liquor by Company. PEONAGE CHARGES ARE DENIED John S. Osgood Says All Men Imported by His Corporation Were Told that Strike Was In Progress.

DENVER, Colo., Feb. 13.—"Saloons seem to us a necessity in mining camps," declared John S. Osgood, chairman of the board of directors of the Victor-American Fuel company, in cross-examination today before the house committee investigating the Colorado miners' strike. The coal operator was questioned by E. P. Costigan, attorney for the strikers, regarding the charge in a recent report of the federal grand jury at Pueblo that the mining companies run saloons on their properties. "I cannot speak for the other companies, but we regulate the saloons in our camps," replied Mr. Osgood. "They seem to us a necessity in mining camps. In two of our mines, as an experiment, we transferred the saloons into clubs, with reading rooms and other conveniences. We also prohibited treating. We found that at those camps, on an average, the miners spent about \$2 less per month each for liquor than those at other mines. At Redstone, one of these two camps, I never saw a drunken man in five or six years, although the men were drinking constantly." "The witness told of an anarchist saloon which he said was run by enemies of the mine owners in Asaular Canon. He said that a red flag with a bowie knife on it, floated over the saloon. Mr. Costigan asked the witness about political conditions in southern Colorado. Mr. Osgood denied any knowledge of political activity by the mine owners. He emphatically disavowed any action by himself in influencing politics.

THINK WOMAN TOOK LIFE

Authorities Believe Mrs. Billings Committed Suicide. SOUGHT TO KILL CHILDREN Coroner's Physician Has Not Completed Analysis of Contents of Stomach to Determine Manner of Her Death.

THINK WOMAN TOOK LIFE

That Mrs. F. C. Billings, 40 North Twenty-fifth street, took her own life by swallowing poison and attempted to do away with her two children in the same manner is now the belief of the police. Clarence Schuman, one of the dead woman's children, who was found dangerously ill and who at first was thought to have been connected with his mother's death, was released from custody yesterday afternoon. Coroner's Physician McNeenahan has not completed his analysis of the dead woman's stomach to determine what kind of poison she took. "There was no reason for anyone to suspect Clarence at any time," declared the boy's father yesterday. "He loved his mother dearly. She had been feeling morose for the last few days and I think that in a fit of despondency she took the poison." Coroner Crosby will hold an inquest probably Monday. The funeral will be held Saturday afternoon at the Crosby chapel and burial will be in Forest Lawn.

DES MOINES WATER IS LOW

Scare About Supply Started by Precautionary Notice.

WOULD STOP FLUSHING SEWERS

The water is drawn from beneath the Coon river, which is filled with ice and very little water is running. The extent of the drain by reason of taking an excessive supply for city purposes has caused fear that the water supply will become low enough to cause danger to health.

Four Men Killed by Explosion of Powder

J., Feb. 13.—Four employees of the Hercules Powder works were killed in an explosion late last night which destroyed the packing house of the plant, where tons of powder were ready for shipment to Mexico. So complete was the destruction that none of the officials of the plant could even guess at the cause. The detonation was heard for miles.

CALL NEBRASKA RATE MODEL

(Continued from Page One.) of the locals to and from the Missouri river. Chairman Clarke explained that the Nebraska board had been at work for a number of years on a schedule of rates for that state; that a schedule had finally been worked out, based on the actual experience of the Nebraska roads, and that it was felt the schedule would bear comparison with any scale of rates for the local distribution of merchandise.

Fourth-Class Rates.

Mr. Clarke informed Commissioner Prouty that it had been found from examination of nearly 200,000 waybills that less than one-half of 1 per cent of fourth class freight moved in carload lots in Nebraska, and that the Nebraska interstate body had deemed it wise, therefore, to establish such a relation as would make the fifth class rate 50 per cent of the first class. Mr. Prouty conceded that if the facts stated were correct the Nebraska scale was constructed upon a more scientific basis than the interstate scale, and intimated that the interstate body might be disposed to make some concessions in order to bring
