

LOANED BLACK TONY MONEY

Mrs. Sadie Walker of Lincoln Takes Stolen Jewelry as Collateral.

UP BEFORE THE GRAND JURY

Gunman and Robbers Give Their Testimony, Followed by Hazel McVey and Frankie Williams, an Inmate.

Evidence now in the hands of the police points to the effect that Mrs. Sadie Walker, night cigar counter clerk at the Jandell hotel, Lincoln, has considerable of the jewelry of Tony Clarietta secured from the McVey holdup on the night of January 15.

The agreement states that Mrs. Walker was to receive \$50 interest for the use of the money, making the amount payable to her at \$20. This total, however, has been raised to \$25 in the agreement.

Williams and Clarietta were brought before Chief of Detectives Malone this morning and made contradictory statements against each other.

Motion for Retrial of Father Williams' Case in Higher Court

A motion for a rehearing and a brief in support of the motion was filed in the supreme court yesterday by Assistant City Attorney Louis J. TePool, who represents Father Williams, who was disfranchised under the "honest elections law."

In his brief Te Pool says the "court has misconstrued" the attorneys' contention that the law is unjust and discriminatory.

Father Williams' attorneys will seek to show that the constitutional rights of citizens are violated and outraged by this law; that it does not in reality safeguard the public from illegal voters, but by discriminating against the known naturalized voter in favor of the man who says he is American born opens the way to fraud.

The election commissioner's interpretation of the law is that a man who says he is American born is permitted, on the unsupported assertion, to cast a ballot, but the man who was naturalized, even for a lifetime, must produce his naturalization papers.

Water Board Will Buy Its Own Bonds

Purchase of \$400,000 water bonds by the metropolitan water district has been authorized by the board of directors. The plan is to save interest on the bonds, the district holding them until money is needed, when they may be sold again, although attorneys have raised the point that it is probably a retirement of the bonds to purchase them and that a second sale would be illegal.

Mission Closes; No Hungry Men to Feed

Because of the scarcity of unemployed men who are in need of food and without the money to pay for it, the Calvary mission, 116 North Tenth street, has been closed. An order received at the mission to supply 100 men for the ice harvest remains unfulfilled.
