MANY CHINKS GAIN ADMISSION

Figures Show that Nearly Two Million Allens Entered Last Year, 359,720 More Than in

1912.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 .- Commissioner General Caminetti of the bureau of immigration in his first annual report, submitted today to Secretary Wilson, recommended certain modifications of the Chinese exclusion act, and expressed the opinion that great care should be taken with the seamen's bill pending in congress, declaring that "the seamen's bill on the one hand and the immigration and Chinese exclusion laws on the other cannot be properly enforced unless their terms are brought into substantial and practical accord."

Commissioner Caminetti made no reference to the general question of Asiatic immigration, other than a comment on "aliens employed on vessels," and what he says is the danger of Chinese and other Asiatics getting in unlawfully by serving as seamen and deserting.
