

ROUND-THE-WORLD AIR FLIGHT ATTRACTS MANY

The first round-the-world air flight is planned to start from the grounds of the Panama-Pacific International exposition in May, 1915. Airmen from all the nations of civilization, in air craft of every type, will contend for the largest prize fund ever offered in any sporting event in history. Three hundred thousand dollars will be distributed among the victors. The route will pass eastward across the American continent, the Atlantic, Europe. Russia, Asia and the Pacific ocean to Alaska, thence the flyers will proceed to San Francisco,

A time limit of ninety days is placed upon the contest, which will have the sanction of the Federation Aeronautique Internationale, the central organization of aernautical bodies in every civilized country on the globe.

WILL SHOW RARE CHINESE FABRICS AT SAN FRANCISCO

Notes on Panama Exposition.

The ministry of commerce of Japan has announced officially that Japan will participate in the Panama-Pacific International exposition at San Francisco in 1915. The amount for the Japanese representation which has been recommended by the Japanese authorities is \$600,000.

The United States commission to South America, representing the Panama-Pacific International exposition, reports that all the seven countries visited by them—Brazil, Uruguay, Argentina, Chile, Bolivia, Peru and Venezuela—will have extensive exhibits at the exposition. Argentina recently appropriated \$1,590,000 of government funds, which places that nation at the head of all foreign countries participating.

Eight of the nine renowned painters engaged to produce the mural decorations for the Panama-Pacific International exposition are busily engaged setting up their canvases in an improvished studio in the huge Palace of Machinery. The artists are Edward Simmons, Frank Du Mond, William I. Dodge, E. Mitton Sancroft, Robert Reid, Charles Holloway, Childe Hassam and Arthur Matthewa. Frank Brangwyn, the ninth painter, is in London and is not expected here until October, when he will come with finished canvases.

A "Bee Exhibit" is being planned under the direction of Thomas G. Stalismith, chief of the department of agriculturs of the Panama-Pacific exposition. The bees, installed in glass hives, where visitors can watch queens, workers and males, will have the range of the many hundred acres of flowers which will be blooming upon the grounds continuously for the months of the exposition. The other decorators have assembled in San Francisco with half-finished paintings, so that they may tone their canvases to the color scheme of the exposition.

The pointing machine a mechanism for the enlargement of statuary from models, is being used for the first time in the art department of a great exposition at the Panama-Pacific International exposition at udios. The machine was invented by Robert Paine, who, as assistant to August St. Gaudens at the time of the Chicago World's fair, conceived the idea that the laborious work of preparing colossal sculptural figures could be done more quickly by mechanical means. The machine allows the competion of work, which before consumed a year or more, in one month.

Dirigible Airship to Make Passenger Trips During Fair

The Panama-Pacific International exposition has made an agreement with the Parseval company of Hamburg, Germany, to operate a Parseval dirigible at the ex-

The dirigible will be the largest ever constructed, having a length of 480 feet and a width of 80 feet and will cost \$250,-Contestants' Standing on. The hanger, or house in which it will be kept when on exhibition, will be cost of \$60,000. A gas plant will be built, period of one year. costing \$40,000. The gigantic airship will make trips of fifty miles length, carrying passengers, at \$25 each. Two licensed crews of eight members in each crew, from Germany, will accompany the dirigible to America and operate it while at
