

GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Trade Abnormally Dull and is Confined to Professionals.

CORN PIT HOLDS ITS OWN

Yellow Corn Maintains Good Level and the Prospects are for an Increased Activity in the Grain.

OMAHA, Feb. 17, 1914. The trade was abnormally dull yesterday in wheat and price changes were held within a range of six cents. Business was confined largely to the ranks of the professional, with the number of outside buyers extremely small.

There was an undercurrent of strength which was caused by the advances in the markets of the old world, together with rains in India, where the harvesting of wheat is now well advanced. It is felt that the country is out of the running as an exporter under present circumstances.

Under rather bearish circumstances conditions in the corn market were held steady and showed a small uptick for the day. Commission houses report notices of consignments of wheat from Australia and prospects for a liberal increase in the movement. Kansas City reported nearly 100 cars left over from the market Saturday, and this was reflected by the small takings at Chicago yesterday, purchases amounting to only 45,000 bushels.

There was a dull and narrow market in oats, but the feeling was strong, in sympathy with the wheat market. Chicago is now carrying 104,000 bushels. There were decreases in all stocks and the market was an increasing one in the country movement.

Fit detectives in the provisions market advanced the opinion after the close last night that the market for May and July yard was for foreign account. Local losses realized, and this depressed provision prices moderately.
