SAY DIFFERENCE IS UNJUST

Commission Men Are Obligated to Pay Toll of 25 Cents Per Crate on Bananas that Are Sent Into Iowa.

It costs up to 25 cents to carry a crate of bananas across the railroad bridges to Council Bluffs when they go by express.

This is the paradox the Omaha jobbers and produce commission men face since the express companies have raised rates and have made a fine distinction between goods sent from Omaha to points in Iowa and that sent from Council Bluffs to Iowa.

Produce men are worried about it, for the same is true of other articles besides bananas. Hence the discrepancy affects a large field of industry in Omaha, especially those industries that have had a large trade in Iowa.

KUGEL WOULD FEED GARBAGE

"You talk about a Lincoln highway," said Park Commissioner Joe Hummel, speaking before the Ad club at the regular weekly luncheon at the Paxton hotel at noon, "but I tell you if we are going to stop some of these thousands of people that will travel through here and hold them here for a few days, we must have something to show them. It takes money to establish parks and build boulevards, but if we want the tourists to think anything of our city we must have these things."

"There is no comparison between the park and boulevard systems of Omaha and other large cities. Kansas City has spent \$12,000,000 on its parks and boulevards, and the total bonded indebtedness of Omaha for these purposes is \$500,000. Think of it. We can't do these things without money."
