SAY DIFFERENCE IS UNJUST

Commission Men Are Obliged to Pay Toll of 35 Cents Per Crate on Bananas that Are Sent

Into lown. It costs up to 35 cents to carry a crate of bananas across the railroad bridges to Council Bluffs when they go by ex-

It costs 25 cents for a passenger to ride the plush across the same bridge in the

finest rallway coach. This is the paradox the Omaha jobbers and produce commission men face since the express companies have raised rates and have made a fine distinction between goods sent from Omaha to points in lows and that sent from Council Bluffs to Iowa. It all comes about through the fact that the shipments from Council Bluffs to points in Iowa are intrastate shipments, while those from Omaha to points in Iowa are interstate shipments. The Interstate Commerce commission fixed that matter. It costs \$5 cents more, for example, to ship a crate of bananas from Omaha to almost any point in Iowa than it does to ship the same crate to the same place from Council Bluffs.

Produce men are worried about it, for the same is true of other articles besides bananas. Hence the discrepancy affects a large field of industry in Omaha, especially those industries that have had a large trade in Iowa. Through the traffic
