BOY JUMPS THROUGH WINDOW Omaha Men Attend

Lawrence Smith Falls Three Stories in Trying to Avoid Arrest.

SUSTAINS A BROKEN WRIST

Youth Was Being Sought by Proba tion Officer Bernstein When He Makes Desperate Effort to Escape.

In an effort to resist his arrest by Probation Officer Bernstein, Lawrence Smith, 16 years old, jumped through a heavy glass window from the roar of 2301 Douglas street, sustaining in a fall of about three stories only a broken wrist and some minor scalp wounds. Young Smith has been under the surveillance of the juvenile court for the last year. but about a week ago broke out afrosh in misdemeanors and would have been arrested then only for the elemency of Officer Bernstein who thought there might be a chance for the youngster to actually reform.

Lawrence continued for the worse, however, and when he was sought at his home he made a run for the window and after breaking it in his flight he fell to a porch below and from there made a second jump to a pit in the back of the The officer started down stairs when the mother became hysterical and attempted to follow the course taken by her son, but was stopped by Bernstein.
