

VETERAN GENERAL IN OMAHA

Soldier Who Built Fort Robinson is Enroute to Honolulu.

SHOT BUFFALO ON THE PLAINS

Last of Army Officers of the Old School and One of the Oldest in Point of Service Still on Duty.

En route to Honolulu, where he will take command, accompanied by his wife, Major General Carter of the United States army passed through Omaha yesterday on Northwestern-Pacific No. 17.

General Carter is the last of the army officers of the old school and in point of service is one of the oldest men.

Although General Carter does not know how long he will remain in Honolulu, he predicts that he will be on the Sandwich Islands for a couple of years, at least.

Among army officers General Carter is looked upon as the pioneer. More than forty years ago he established and constructed Fort Robinson, near Crawford, Neb., and was the leading spirit when it came to the pacification of the Indians.

When I went up to locate and build Fort Robinson, the whole northwestern Nebraska was a wilderness. There were Indians everywhere and many of them were not as friendly as now.

Asked about aeroplanes and their practicability in times of war and for army purposes, General Carter remarked:
