

FEDS ARE PREPARED TO MIX

Gilmore wants Tinker and Johnson to Leave Men Alone.

JOE TINKER GIVES OUT LINEUP

Ad Brennan and Claude Hendrix Will Do the Heavy Work on Mound for Chicago Club.

CHICAGO, March 3.—Word was sent to the president of the National and American base ball leagues today that the Federal league was prepared to fight for its treatment and would meet in kind any efforts to lure away players who had a contract with the new league.

In a telegram addressed to John K. Tener, president of the National league, and to Ban B. Johnson, head of the American league, President Gilmore of the Federals threw down the challenge which may result in another base ball war.

The lineup of the Chicago Federals was given out today by Manager Tinker, who said that he was satisfied that his team would be a pennant winner, as he has four swift men—Jackson, who led the Northwest league in stolen bases last year; Cad Cole, who led the New York State league in stolen bases and stole twenty-five bases; Max Flack, who hit for an average of .333 and stole forty-two bases in the Three-I league; and John Muncie, a ten-second man who played with the University of Minnesota team last season.

Ad Brennan and Claude Hendrix will do the heavy work of the pitching staff. The Chicago team did not get started, though he will go south with Tinker's men to begin training. Later he will join Brooklyn.

Fred Ayer Team Wins Solomon Dog Derby

NOME, Alaska, March 3.—Fred Ayer finished first in the Solomon Derby dog race that was run from Nome over the snow trail to Solomon and return yesterday. John Johnson, winner of last year's derby, was a close second with his team of Siberian wolves and finished two minutes after Ayer.

The five teams that entered the race started under clear skies from Nome at 10 a. m., but a wind and snow storm that reached the proportions of a blizzard developed as the race progressed and the heavy going destroyed chances of lowering time records of other years.

Ayer finished the course of sixty-four miles in 6 hours, 35 minutes, 4 seconds. Johnson's time last year, which fixed the record for the course, was 7 hours, 47 minutes, 34 seconds.

Nick Maddox Will Manage Wichita

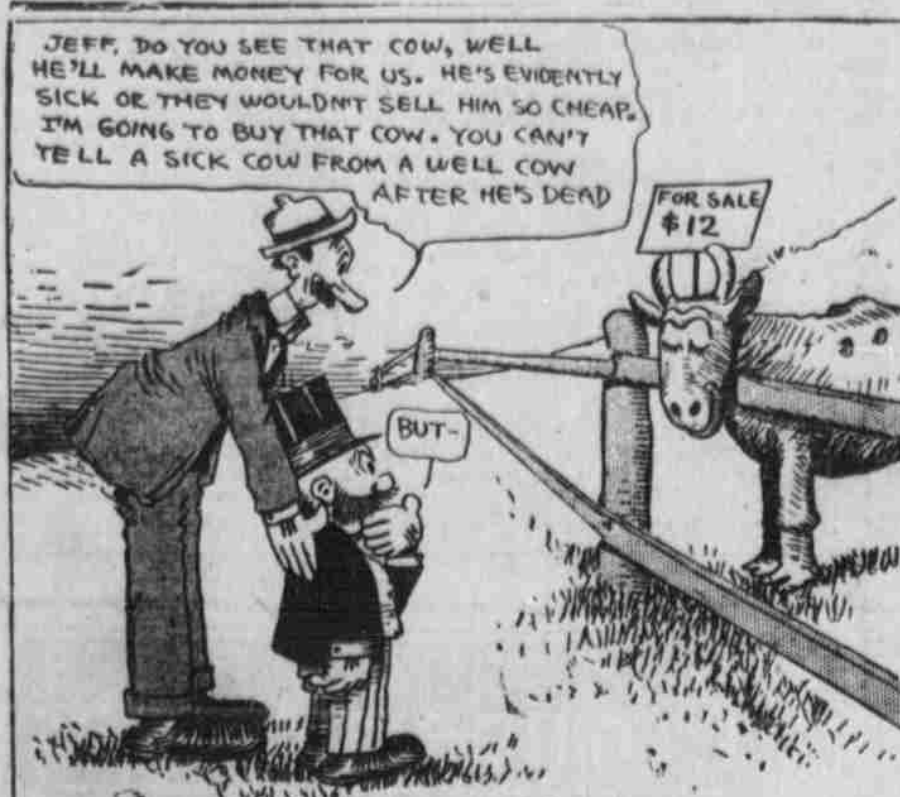

FRICK RUMORED TO BE THE MAN

Leverenz of Browns, Said to Be One of Best Southpaws in American League, Reported Engaged by K. C. Outlaws.

CHICAGO, March 3.—President Gilmore of the Federal league announced tonight that a "Pittsburgh millionaire" had decided to become backer of the club there. Stories that Henry C. Frick of Pittsburgh had contemplated taking an active part in the national game have been current and although Gilmore would not say Mr. Frick was the man, followers of the game here believe he is the "millionaire" mentioned.

It became known that Tom Seaton, the pitcher last year with Philadelphia, would join the Chicago Federals. It was understood that Brooklyn was to get Seaton, but the situation on Saturday gave him to Tinker's club.

Ground will be broken for the local Federal league stands Wednesday, President Weeghman said today. The contractors who bid for the privilege of building the stand all agreed to have it finished by April 21.

Much disappointment was shown by the Federal league managers when it was learned that Christy Muesowen had signed a contract with the Giants, and had not waited for their offer of \$65,000 for three years, made today in a telegram by President Gilmore.

Muesowen was wanted to manage and pitch of the Brooklyn team, but efforts will be made to get Stan Crawford, while President Gilmore intimated that Fielder Jones, former manager of the Chicago Americans, might be made an offer.

The Kansas City team of the Federal league practically has engaged Leverenz of the St. Louis Americans, it was learned. Leverenz is with the world's best pitchers among the American league left handers.

M'FARLAND DOES NOT APPEAR BEFORE BOARD

MILWAUKEE, Wis., March 3.—Packy McFarland, Chicago, failed to appear before the Wisconsin Boxing commission today when his case, relative to his suspension for one year for alleged "stalling" in his ten-round boxing bout with Jack Britton in Milwaukee December 3, came up. Neither was McFarland represented by counsel. After hearing testimony from the referee and several sporting writers, the commission took the case under advisement.

Referee Harry Stout told the commission that he warned McFarland at the end of practically every round from the second that he would have to "produce or get out." Stout maintained that McFarland did not put forth his best efforts at any time during the bout and that he "stalled" all the way.

Stout's testimony was upheld by several Milwaukee sporting writers.

NEW INDOOR RECORDS MADE

Five Established at Big Meet in Madison Square Garden.

TWO MORE OF THEM EQUALED

Halpin and Meyers set Championship Marks by Winning Six and Three-Hundred-Yard Races.

NEW YORK, March 3.—Five new championship records, two of which established new world's indoor marks, were made at the indoor national championships of the Amateur Athletic union held at Madison Square garden tonight. Two other championship records were equaled.

Thomas J. Halpin of the Boston Athletic association and Alvah T. Meyers of the Irish-American Athletic club set the two new world's records. Halpin won the 600-yard run in 1:15. Meyers, in the 300-yard run, established a record of 0:32.4.

Other Records. The other events in which new championship figures were hung up were the two-mile walk, won by Richard F. Remer, Irish-American Athletic club, in 14:21.4; the 1,000-yard run, won by Abel R. Kiviat, Irish-American Athletic club, in 2:15.5; and the two-mile run, won by Harry J. Smith, Bronx Church house, New York, in 9:15.

Platt Adams of New York was a triple winner, winning the standing high jump, standing broad jump and pole vault for distance. Meyers and Patrick J. McDonald, both of the Irish-American Athletic club, were double winners. In addition to making his record in the 300-yard dash, McDonald captured the 24-pound shot put and was first in throwing the 56-pound weight for height.

The championship pole vault was won by the Irish-American Athletic club, with the New York Athletic club second and the Boston Athletic association third.

LONDON, March 3.—Lord Roberts, Viscount Milner, Baron Balfour of Bureleigh, Rudyard Kipling, Prof. Albert Vonn Dicoy, Sir William Ramsay and a score of less prominent persons today issued an appeal to their fellow countrymen to follow their example in signing a declaration, which is milder in form than the Ulster covenant, by which they hold themselves, in case the Irish home rule bill becomes a law without first being submitted to the judgment of the nation, "justified in taking or supporting any action that may be effective to prevent it being put in operation."
