General Meagher's Sword Presented to Notre Dame School

NOTRE DAME, Ind. March 4.- The sword of General Prancis Meagher, commander of the Irish brigade in the civil war, was today presented to the University of Notre Dame, to rest near the body of Father Corby, the chaplain, who, with hands uplifted, gave in the midst of shot and shell final absolution to the soldiers of the brigade on the battlefield of Gettysburg. The presentation of the sword to the university was made by United States Senator Thomas J. Walsh of Montana, where General Meagher died while setting as governor.

W. Bourke Cockran of New York was the orator selected to tell of the significance that attaches to the Meagher sword; of the general's sentence to be hanged for treason to the British government, owing largely to a speech in Dublin when as representative of the Ireland revolutionary party Meagher had "declined to stigmatize the sword," and had given as a reason the famous passage, beginning: "At its blow a great nation started from the waters of the Atlantic."

In the reference to the many battlefields on which Meagher and his brigade distingulshed themselves, special emphasis was given to the charge up the heights of Fredericksburg, celebrated in one of the poems of John Boyle O'Reilly, the struggle in which Meagher's men went against other Irish commanded by the dashing confederate, General Pat Claburne, of Texas.

During the ceremonies today cadets of the university acted as a guard of honor for the sword. Representatives of Irish societies of Chicago and other cities were in attendance.

Washington Officials Said to Have Had Conclusive Evidence of Manner of Benton's Death in Possession for Several Days.

NOGALES, Sonera, March 4 .- A commission to investigate the Benton case has been appointed by General Carranga. The decision was taken just after a long session of the provisional cabinet. It was said that the death at Jaures of the British subject, W. S. Benton, had occupied practically all the attention of General Carranan and his advisers.

No Further Orders Yet. EL PASO, Tex., March 4.-It is now four days since the commission appointed to investigate the killing of William S. Benton was halted by rebel orders, and the members today were without further instructions. What these will be is said to depend on negotiations now being carried on between Washington and Car-
