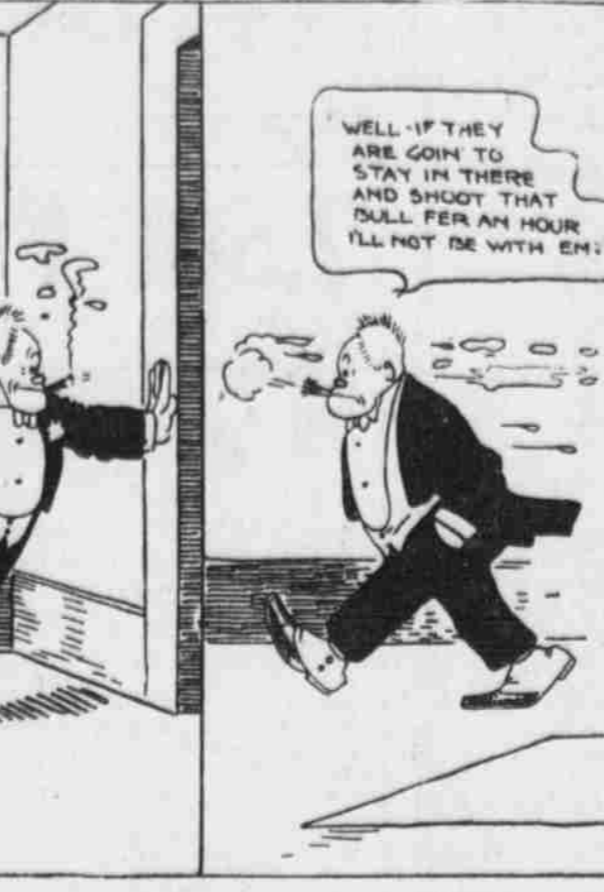
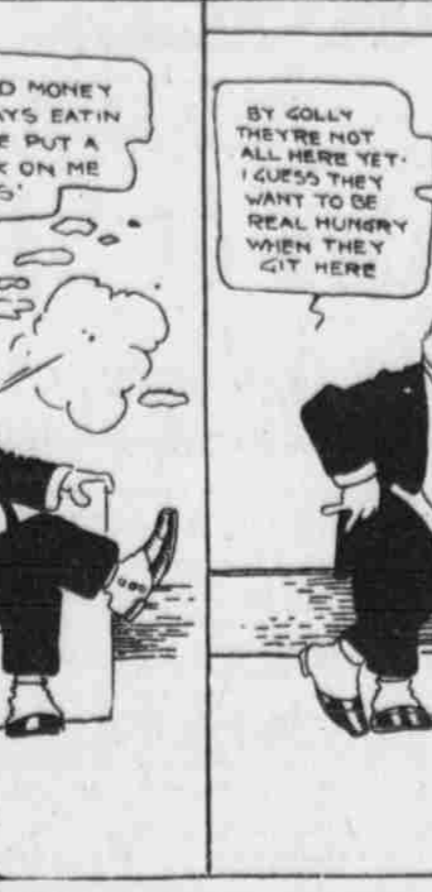

WORK BEGINS ON FED PLANT

First Spade of Earth Turned at the Grounds of Chicago Club.

MAYOR UNABLE TO BE PRESENT

Gilmore and Weeghman, with Gates of Indianapolis, Leave for New York to Help Welcome Tourists.

CHICAGO, March 4.—Work was begun today on the Chicago Federal league club's plant at Addison avenue and North Clark street. A band concert and brief speeches by President Gilmore of the league and President Weeghman of the local club, were features of the ceremony attending the turning of the first spade of earth. Mayor Harrison, who is recovering from a serious illness could not attend, but he was represented by Henry Ericson, building commissioner, who spaded a shallow hole near the site of the main entrance and into the excavation the contents of a bottle of champagne were poured.

VENOMOUS CARP THREATENS
