MRS. FALLERS FILES REPORT

Story of Wife's Untiring Efforts to Clear Murder Mystery.

DYNAMITE USED IN THE RIVER

skeleton Found on Iowa Side Stream Has Around it Belt Identified as Like One Worn by Toll Collector.

Evidences of the unremitting energy of wife to clear up the mystery surroundng her husband's death, and the loyalty and love that prompted her to spare no expense, was told in the final report of Mrs. Fay M. Fallers, executrix of the sstate of Horace E. Fallers, the bridge toll collector, who was murdered on the night of July 3, 1911, and his body thrown into the Missouri river. The report was filed in the district court and contains an explicit statement of the purposes for which all of the money expended by her was used. It shows that Mrs. Pallers expended more than \$200 immediately after the disappearance of her husband

in the effort to recover his body. The report is almost a narrative of the tragedy that brought her such sorrow. it tells of the employment by Mrs. Fallers of expert river men to drag the river and patrol the stream far below the Douglas street bridge and of the use of dynamite to be used in the effort to force the body to rise.
