TAFT GAINING, SAYS WORLD

Coincident with Admission is Report that Business is Better.

ALL CONDITIONS ARE FAVORABLE

Now Up to People to Say if They Want This Unusually Good State of Affairs to Remain Undisturbed.

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—(Special.)—"Taft is gaining," says the democratic New York World, a few days before election. Coincident with that admission these headlines are noticeable in the press: "Grains Firm, Slightly Higher. Prices tending upward," "conditions more favorable for Trade Expansion," "Heavy demand for goods," "Business Men for Taft. Financial depression would follow republican defeat, say 92 per cent of those canvassed."

"Then comes another democratic newspaper, which says: "The veto power no longer need be reckoned with in the framing of legislation to regulate our industries on a new basis. If the democratic candidate (Wilson) is elected."

"Those few lines present the situation in

a nutshell as the American voters make ready to march to the polls.

With every line of business prospering there are bright hopes for the future, subject only to the possibility of democratic victory on next Tuesday, and the "readjustment" or "regulation" of our industries on a free trade tariff basis.

A veto can be given to the democratic program by the business interests of this nation, on election day. Indications are that veto will be voted. The menace of next March or April can be prevented by right action in November and that is why business men, 92 per cent of those canvassed," as one newspaper states, are for President Taft's re-election.

How about the other 8 per cent? Are you included in that small minority? Why not get into line with your fellows, your business associates, and vote for the greatest good for the greatest number, for a continuance of "business prosperity, against a change in our tariff system, against all assaults on our constitution and our courts?"

Calamity Howl from Opposition.

Democratic and third-term advocates are calamity howlers. Their chief issue is that this government is obsolete, that it must be changed from top to bottom. Senator Pollock of the state of Washington, a third-term advocate, says: "This government is not only the most obsolete, it also is the most irresponsible and

irresponsible of any government in the world."

"Let us change the government and the laws," shout the third-term leaders, then the democrats. "We are the only salvation of the United States." Senator Poindexter, he it said, has been on the public payroll almost continuously for the last twenty years. He has succeeded in staying there by shouting louder for every "ism" which has arisen, than his opponents, from free silver in 1896, to the abolition of the "obsolete" constitution in 1912.

Program of Turmoil.

A program of turmoil, uncertainty, instability, experimenting with government, something new, not because it is better than the old, but because it is new, is offered and urged upon the American people by both third-termers and democrats.

There will be no extra session to paralyze business, no tinkering with the protective tariff system, no competition with the overproduction of overpopulated foreign countries, no abolition of our rights as guaranteed by the constitution, if the republican party receives a vote of confidence from the voters on next Tuesday.

If the American people should elect Wilson to the presidency, they would have to "trust Providence" as a prominent democrat has said, for what may happen. There is a good old saying, however, that Providence helps those who help themselves. If the American people vote for their own best interests, would they not have better reason to expect the blessing of Providence for continued prosperity?

Do you want your industry and your wages "readjusted" or "regulated" by the democrats or third-term calamity howlers?

Wall Street Money.

George W. Perkins cries "all the money in Wall street" has been raised to reelect President Taft, when he knows that more "Wall street" money has flowed into the third-term coffers than into the republican campaign fund. Henry C. Hansbrough, former United States senator from North Dakota, says: "The government is getting further and further from Wall street every day. This is due in large part to the business policy of the present secretary of the treasury. This declaration of independence on the part of the Treasury department is emphasized in Secretary MacVeagh's proposal of a few months ago that the federal government stand ready to move the crops. It was a great lesson in finance, so simple that little was said of it in financial publications."

FELS EXPLAINS TO COUNCIL

Follower of George Doctrines Wants City to Adopt Single Tax Plan.

WOULD INCREASE POPULATION

Tells Commissioners if Plan Was Adopted Population in Twenty Years Would Be a Half Million.

Joseph Fels, millionaire soap manufacturer and world's leading advocate of Henry George's plan to tax land values only, held a conversation for two hours with the city commission Friday morning. He said he had a plan by which the commissioners could perpetuate themselves in office and outlined it: A campaign to have land assessments made once each year instead of every four years, elimination of taxes on personal property, adoption of the system Houston, Tex., is working under, which is the nearest approach in this country to the single tax.

"If you would do this Omaha would be a city of half a million in twenty years," said Mr. Fels. "Two or three men, working to inform the people on this issue could accomplish this. I don't think you'd have to change the constitution and probably not a state law."

St. Louis, Kansas City, Springfield and Jefferson City, Mo., will adopt the single tax, believes Mr. Fels.

"No man with a full stomach has a right to rest while other people are hungry," Fels declared. "The single tax would absolutely do away with poverty in this country. All this fool business of taxation under your present system makes people lars and thieves. They lie about the value of their property, the amount of money they have."

Fels asked the council to adopt a resolution approving the single tax. The council took the plan under advisement. He said he would pay the expense of a junket to Houston if any councilman

went there, inspected the system of taxation and came back unconvinced.

Pat Crowe Arrested in Des Moines by Omaha Police Order

DES MOINES, Ia., Nov. 1.—Pat Crowe, kidnapper, was arrested here last night at the request of the Omaha police. He is wanted there for breaking jail while serving a short sentence for vagrancy.

Crowe got out of the Douglas county jail on September 15, after having served fifteen days of a ninety-day sentence because he was suffering with what appeared to be an abscess—now believed to have been a beggar's fake—he was sent to the county hospital. There he quickly recovered and walked out to freedom. Subsequently he was arrested for drunkenness in Council Bluffs, finally being released upon his promise to leave town. It was only after Crowe had left these parts that the Omaha police learned he had evaded most of his Omaha sentence.

In the county jail he was in the sheriff's custody. When he was removed to the hospital the sheriff's staff bothered itself no more about him.
