RAILROADS ARE INDICTED

Five Charged with Granting Concessions on Alfalfa Shipments.

OTHER INDICTMENTS RETURNED

Two Held for Robbing the Mails and One with Using Mails to Defraud

Judge Lectures Man Who Asks Sympathy.

The United States grand jury, which has been in session for the last three days adjourned Friday after finding true bills against five railroads.

Among the indictments returned was one against the Missouri Pacific Railway company, in five counts, charging violations of the act of congress of June 8, 1898, for unlawfully granting concessions varying from 4 to 5 cents in respect to each 100 pounds of alfalfa food shipped by the Peter Alfalfa Meal company, in interstate commerce to certain points on the line of the Missouri Pacific.

Other indictments were returned against the Great Western, in four counts, for violations of the same act, in the shipment of alfalfa feed by the same company. Another against the Rock

Island, in four counts; another against the Burlington, in five counts, and a fifth indictment was returned against the Western, in two counts. The minimum penalty provided by this act is a fine of not less than \$1,000, with a maximum of \$20,000.

These indictments grow out of the improper application of transit arrangements by carriers on mixed feed shipments out of Omaha.

State a Corset.

Frank N. Whisenand and Benjamin R. Day, who were arrested a week ago, were indicted for assisting United States mail.

The indictment of Whisenand charges that on September 21 he took from the railway postoffice certain packages, the contents of which are unknown to the grand jurors, and that later he took from a package of United States mail one diamond point fountain pen, 18-karat gold. Day is charged with taking from the mail one corset and other packages and parcels, the contents of which the grand jurors do not know.

H. E. Burupp, who was arrested four months ago charged with using the mails to defraud by that he advertised through the newspapers certain false railroad passes for sale, was indicted, brought before Judge T. C. Moncay where he pleaded guilty and was fined \$100. As he had already served four

months in jail awaiting trial he will have no more to serve to make up the time required to eliminate the \$100 fine.

Baugh Pleads Guilty.

J. W. Baugh was indicted for using the mails to defraud. He was sentenced to sixty days imprisonment in the county jail of Hall county at Grand Island. He pleaded guilty. Baugh is 24 years old, has a wife and one child. Judge Munger told him the court was inclined to be influenced by the fact that Baugh had a wife and family, although the court sharply reminded him that the prisoner and not the court was the one that had taken the oath to protect the family. Baugh has been traveling for a wholesale house and had been sending fake orders through the mails.

Otto Von Gemminger of Fremont is also among those indicted. He is charged with having removed checks from the United States mail bags and having cashed them. He and the other men charged with robbing the mail are to come before the judge this afternoon.

OLD WOODMEN BUILDING SOLD

Three Local Men to Make Modern Hotel of Structure.

TO BUILD LARGE GARAGE ALSO

Adjoining Lots Will Be Purchased and a Modern Garage Will Be Erected for Use of Hotel Patrons and Others.

The Old Woodmen of the World building, 419 South Fifteenth street, has been sold for \$125,000.

A contract has just been signed by the directors of the Woodmen order and J. K. Keenan, Dr. Philip Sher and Harry A. Wolf, whereby the property reverts to the latter three men, who will remodel it into a modern fireproof hotel of 120 rooms.

Carpenters and decorators will be started to work in the building immediately to make it ready for occupancy as the Carlton hotel, next March. The hotel will be operated by William Roush, proprietor of the Drexel hotel.

The old Woodmen of the World building is a five-story brick structure and was occupied for about twenty years by the officials and office employees of the order which has just completed the

erection of the eighteen-story building at Fourteenth and Farnam streets. It formerly was known as the Sheely property.

Many innovations in hotel construction and equipment will be installed in the Carlton hotel. Fifty of the rooms will have baths adjoining and shower baths on every floor.

Water Board Refuses to Accept Cudahy's Check

A check for the payment of water rents for the months of July, August and September will be returned by the Water board to the Cudahy Packing company, in South Omaha, in accordance with action taken by that body at a meeting in the city hall Thursday afternoon. The check was refused by the board, as it did not cover the entire amount of rentals for the months named. The board recently increased the rates for packing companies in South Omaha to 5 cents. The Cudahy people objected to paying the amount, claiming that they did not get as much pressure per cubic foot as the other companies, but the check was for 94 cents per 1,000 gallons. The board refused the check even as part payment, as it would prevent them from shutting off the water at the plant if they so desired.
