EARLY TRIAL FOR GANGSTERS

Jury Ordered that Will Dispose of Men Who Killed Rosenthal.

GUNMEN TO BE TRIED SEPARATE
"Whitey" Lewis the First Against Whom the State Will Proceed in Supreme Justice Goff's Court.

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—The state's determination not to delay the trials of the four gangsters indicted with Lieutenant Charles Becker for the murder of Rosenthal was indicated today when District Attorney Whitman moved before Supreme Court Justice Goff for a special panel of 200 talesmen to be summoned to appear on November 3. The trial of the first of the gunmen is expected to begin November 12 or 14.

Whitman and former Magistrate Wahle, who is counsel for the four accused men, have agreed that they shall be tried separately.

Rosenthal was slain. This new indictment is for perjury in connection with a raid by Becker's squad at a gambling house run by Rosenthal. The defendant is still on duty and Commissioner Waldo has been directed to produce him in court tomorrow.

DEFENSE IN THE LINDLOFF TRIAL SPRINGS A SURPRISE

CHICAGO, Nov. 1.—The defense in the trial of Mrs. Louise Lindloff, crystal seer and medium, charged with poisoning her son, Arthur, surprised the prosecution today by calling Miss Sadie Ray, who had been expected to be a star witness for the state. Miss Ray's testimony was not effective for the prosecution and she was recalled to the stand by Mrs. Lindloff's attorneys.

LOS ANGELES BAKER IS MURDERED IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Nov. 1.—Reinhold Meyer, a retired Los Angeles, Cal., baker, was found shot to death at the home of a sister, Mrs. Martha A. Bicknell, here today. A bullet had passed through his head. A revolver found ten feet away from the chair on which he was found sitting had one discharged cartridge, but no powder marks were found on his skin, which led the police to suppose he had been murdered.

COACH DENNE HAS HIS NERVE

Predicts Victory by Two Touchdowns When Team Meets Creighton.

ST. LOUIS ELEVEN IS ENROUTE
Seek One Day of Rest Before Going Into the Big Battle that is Scheduled for Creighton Field.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 1.—The St. Louis university football team, twenty-five strong, left for Omaha last night to get a day of rest before the game with the strong Creighton team there Saturday. With the exception of Halfback McCarthy, who was injured in the Miami game, every member of the squad is in condition to get into the game if necessary.

All hands are confident and Coach Denne predicts a victory by at least two touchdowns. A light signal drill ended training for Saturday's game.

Practice with Seneca.

PRINCETON, N. J., Nov. 1.—A long signal drill and some defensive work, breaking up opposing formations of the scrub team, constituted the Princeton team's final practice today for the game with Harvard at Cambridge next Saturday.

Harvard Hazed at Work.

CAMDEN, Mass., Nov. 1.—Short, snappy practice, in which the varsity men were lined up against an imposing array of coaches, formed the work of the Harvard football team today in preparing for its game with Princeton Saturday.

Ready for Meet with Drake.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 1.—After Coach Cayou called signals for more than two hours in the gymnasium this afternoon, he led the tired Washington university eleven in a half-hour scrimmage with the second team in a driving rain. After the workout in the mud and water, Cayou called for more signals indoors and had the line develop new formations. All the regulars are in good condition and will line up against Drake university team of Iowa Saturday.

Games in Iowa Saturday.

DES MOINES, Ia., Nov. 1.—Ames and Morningside hold the center of attention in the football games played in Iowa tomorrow. Grinnell and Coe meet in a game which, on the showing of Coe, should be easy for the Grinnellians. State Normal and Leander Clarke battle at Toledo. Simpson is meeting Penn at Oskaloosa today, while Parsons and Central are engaged at Pella. Another game scheduled for today at a late hour is a meeting between Highland Park of Des Moines and the vocational school at Harlan.

MRS. CONWAY TELLS STORY

Relates Talk with Miss Singer Night Before Woman Was Murdered.

GIRL PROPOSED SOME KILLING

Had Marked Stillman as a Victim, He Having Plenty of Money and Some Very Valuable Diamonds.

LIMA, O., Nov. 1.—Two detectives from Chicago who arrived here today to take charge of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Conway, arrested here in connection with the murder of Sophia G. Singer in a Chicago rooming house Monday night, decided to defer their departure to that city until tomorrow.

This decision was reached after hearing of a long statement from Mrs. Conway, who recited in detail their actions on the night of the murder and their movements thereafter. She declared that Miss Singer had told her she was tired of her fiancé, William Worthen, and was to meet a man whom Mrs. Conway believed to be Claude Stillman. She said Miss Singer exhibited to Conway an iron door knob, wrapped up in a handkerchief and said she would get the man whom she was to meet in a lonely place and wanted Conway to hit him with it so that she could get his roll. This Mrs. Conway said her husband declined to do and they left Chicago that night and did not hear of the murder until later.

Mrs. Conway's statement to the detectives in part follows:

"The last Conway and I saw of Sophia Singer was about 10:30 o'clock Monday night. We were preparing to leave Chicago. She had given us \$5 and two suits of clothes for my husband. Worthen had left early in the evening. Miss Singer, who was living with him as his wife, came in the house about 8 o'clock.

"Met a Sweet Fellow."
"Oh," she said, "I met the sweetest fellow named Stillman. He is rather elderly and has lots of diamonds. I am to meet him after 10:30 and we are going to a chop suey place."

"Miss Singer asked Conway to go out with her when she went to meet Stillman. She showed him an iron door knob covered with one of Worthen's handkerchiefs.

"I'll get him up an alley or some place," she said, "and you rap him with this. We'll get his roll."
"My husband refused. She wanted me to go out with her, but Conway wouldn't let me and I didn't want to go anyway. I think she wanted me to come up to them with some sympathy 'rag' and work him for some money. She was angered at us because we would not go."

"The door knob she showed Conway was one she had brought from the house at 247 Indiana avenue. We had moved Monday from there to 323 Indiana.

"I remember having seen her take the knob from a door at the first place several weeks before and put a shoestring through it. I had forgotten all about it until I saw her have it again Monday."

"We left Sophia about 1 o'clock. She was sitting on our bed talking and changing from a pair of black shoes to brown high tops. We had been quarreling a little, but she was of changeable moods and I kissed her good bye."

"We went out of the back way and down an alley. We did this because there was but one key which Sophia had given to Worthen. We took a street car to the interurban station and left for Hammond, Ind. I think we got there about 1 o'clock. We stayed all night in a hotel there and then went to Rochester, Ind. The first I knew about the murder was Tuesday evening while we were at Rochester waiting for a train."

Mrs. Conway said they first learned of Miss Singer's death on the following day, while riding on a railway train between Hammond and Rochester, Ind.

Mrs. Conway's story, the police say, differs from the one told by Conway, from whom she was separated immediately following their arrest.

Paints Stolen Horses; Has Check in Pocket

SEWARD, Neb., Nov. 1.—(Special Telegram)—Though clever enough to paint the faces and feet of two stolen horses and to dye his own hair and remove his beard, Frank Razac, son of a rich farmer of this county, was foolish enough to take a check in payment for the animals and keep it in his pocket, according to charges made at his preliminary hearing here.

Razac, who is 21 years old, was bound over to the district court today under bond of \$1,200.

The horses belong to John Oeschlager and Joseph Dvorak. Ten days ago Razac made arrangements with a horse buyer to sell two animals on October 25 and delivered them on that date, giving his name as Peter Kader. He received a check for \$300. The sheriff was notified of the theft of the horses and it was not long before Razac was arrested. The check was found in his pocket.

WOMAN IS BURNED TO DEATH AT WAGNER, S. D.

MITCHELL, S. D., Nov. 1.—(Sp. Telegram)—A fatal accident happened to Mrs. M. O. D. Cofer at her home in Wagner when she attempted to fill a small gas stove while it was sitting on top of a stove that was quite warm.

The gasoline overflowed in the tank and ran over the stove causing the fluid to ignite and run down on the floor, where it caught fire on a rug. Mrs. Cofer ran out of doors with the burning stove and then hurried back to extinguish the burning rug. Some of the gasoline saturated her dress and when she picked up the flaming rug her clothes caught fire and in a moment she was a mass of flames. Mrs. Cofer lived about eighteen hours and passed away the next morning. She leaves a husband and several children.

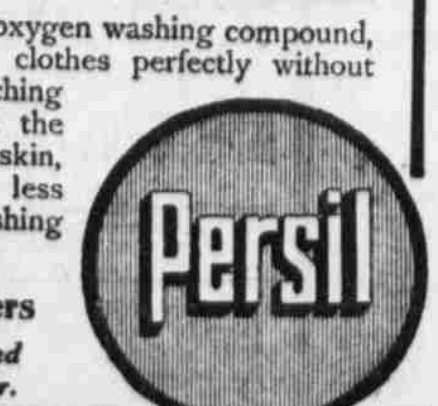
