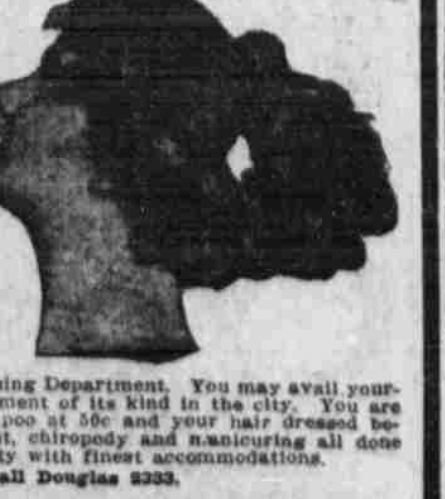

### Stolen Jewelry is Traced Through Omaha to Buffalo

After trailing a trunkful of diamonds and jewelry through Omaha, it has finally been located in Buffalo, N. Y., and the alleged thief is under arrest there. The valuables were stolen at Cheyenne and routed through Omaha in a trunk, which was held here for a time, but released before action could be secured.

Earlier in the week George Joffee of Cheyenne, the owner of the property, got in touch with the court of justice of Judge H. H. Claiborne, and had the trunk, containing \$7,000 worth of valuables, held here when it came in over the Union Pacific. It was held twenty-four hours, but Joffee did not act quickly enough, and it was checked out of here over the Northwestern to Chicago.

Then an effort was made to stop it there, but not before it was well on its way to Buffalo, from which city word comes that the property has been recovered and the alleged thief under arrest. The person accused of stealing the valuables is Ed Fattal. The details of the theft are not known here. As near as can be learned he gained access to the Joffee residence, gathered up all articles of value that he could find, packed them in a trunk and checked them east.
