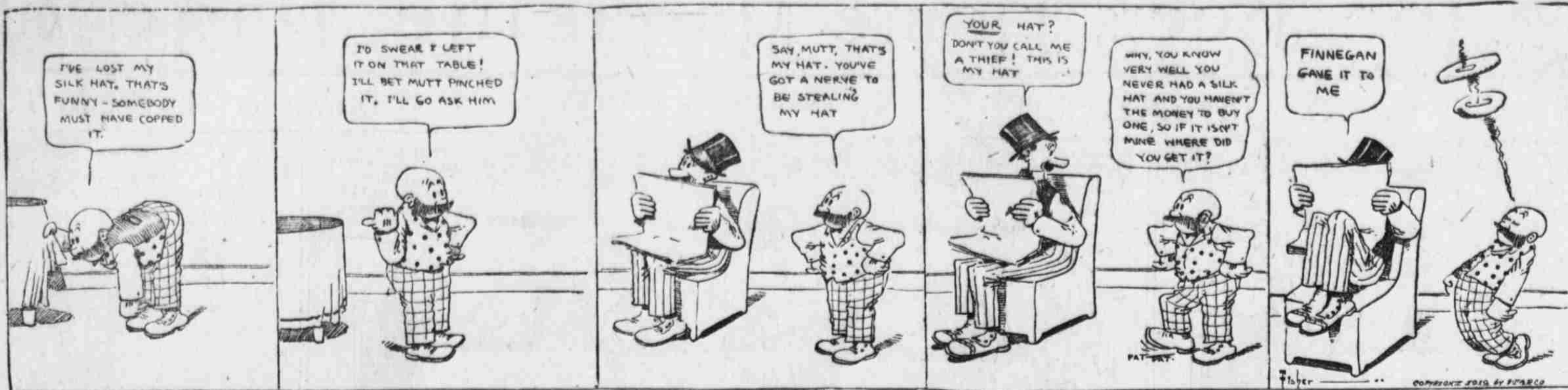

NARROWING DOWN CONTESTS

Foot Ball Games Saturday Eliminate Contenders for Division Titles.

BIG GAME IN EASTERN SECTION

Princeton and Harvard Fight in What Should Be Classic Event of Season, While West Sees Several Good Contests.

Foot ball narrows down today to several of the best struggles of the autumn. In the west the Nebraska-Missouri game will be the chief fare for Missouri Valley conference rooters; while in the "Big Nine," Minnesota and Illinois and Chicago and Wisconsin will from the interesting battles of the day. In the east the Princeton-Harvard game will be the most important battle, because it will eliminate one of three contenders for the eastern championship. Yale, who was scheduled to meet Colgate, will not play, the game being cancelled because of the death of the Yale guard, York, from pneumonia.

Nebraska at Columbia.

For the first time since the good old days of "Bumby" B. O., Nebraska meets Missouri on the latter's home grounds. The contest is expected to be an easy win for the Cornhuskers, who now are playing the best ball they have put up this fall. The team is minus the services of Ross, the colored guard, because Missouri will not permit a negro to play against them; still this absence will not be a great handicap, and the Cornhuskers probably will play one of the finest games of the entire season. They wish to beat the score Ames made against the Tigers which was 29 to 0.

Kansas meets the Oklahoma eleven, which last week was trimmed, 14 to 0, by Missouri. Kansas is thought to have a team with wonderful potential possibilities, and it would not be surprising to see the Jayhawkers asserting some of their power in this battle. Still, most of the power and strength will not come out until the meeting with the Cornhuskers at Lincoln, November 11.

Chicago and Wisconsin will meet at Madison. The Badgers are going fine while Chicago (in the Purdue game especially) has not been showing any great strength. The Badgers should win. In the Illinois-Minnesota contest, the Gophers are likely to score heavily. They are going fast now, and no hind but the strongest kind of a team can stop them. Illinois is not that team.

Michigan Against Coyotes.

Northwestern will find Purdue a hard proposition, though the struggle should be close. Michigan goes into fray with South Dakota. The eleven that whipped Minnesota early in the season, The Wolverines will probably register a large score. Drake should lick Washington at St. Louis. Creighton will find St. Louis a hard foe at Creighton field in Omaha.

In the east the Princeton-Harvard game is holding the center of the boards, with the Crimson the favorite. The two teams have strong backfields, and fairly strong lines. The battle will be close. If Princeton has the break in luck it will win. Dartmouth should find Amherst easy. Carlisle will probably run up a high score on Lehigh. West Point is expected to win easily over Holy Cross. Brown opposes Vermont in what should be an easy fight for the Providence eleven. Penn State and Pennsylvania meet, with Penn State looking like the winner. Cornell faces Williams, and may win its first important game, though Williams is fighting well this fall. Syracuse, the team that defeated Michigan handsly last week, should experience no difficulty with Rochester.

TOLLEFSON, MINNESOTA STAR, IS DISQUALIFIED

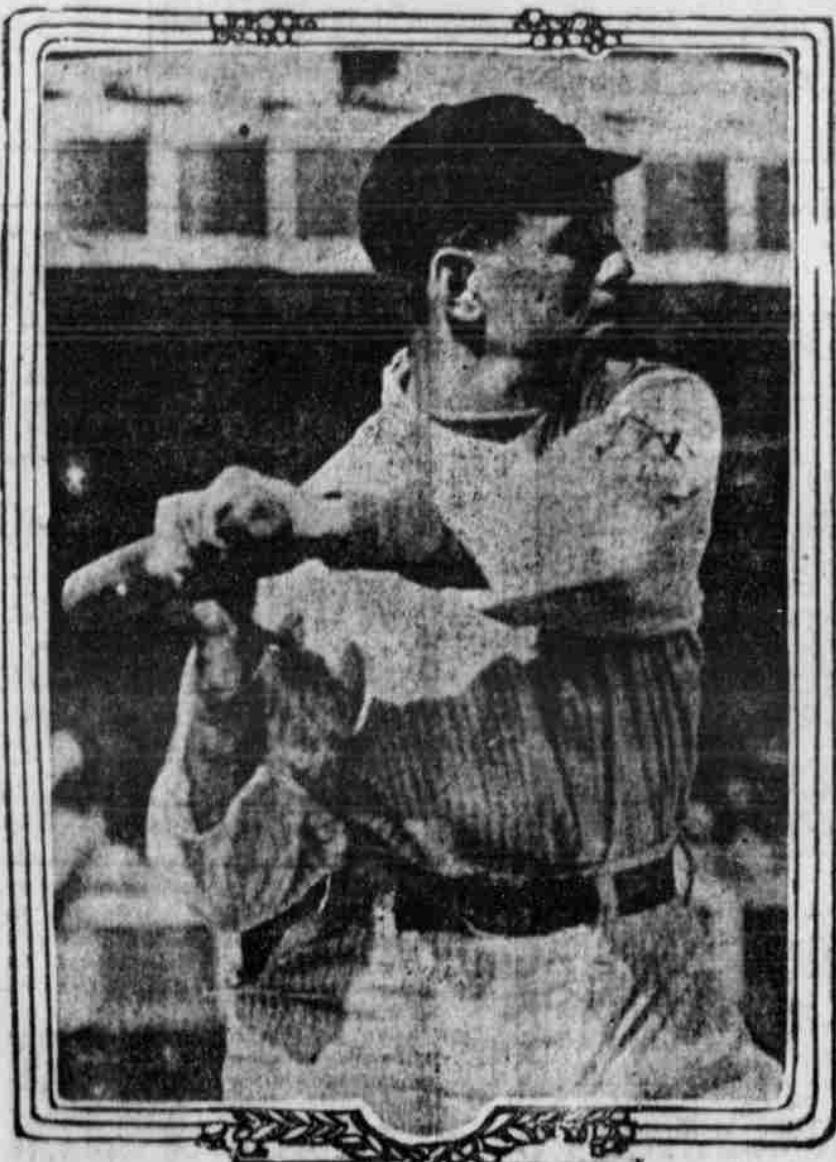
"Pinkie" Hayward, one of the "pony" backs, probably will take his place at quarter.

COTNER TAKES ITS CONTEST

Successfully Works Forward Pass at Critical Moments.

GAINS THE DAY BY 14 TO 10

Kearney Normal Men in Lead in Straight Foot Ball, but Foxy Tactics Prove Their Undoing.

KEARNEY, Neb., Nov. 1.—(Special Telegram.)—By working forward passes successfully at three critical moments, Cotner university took their game today from the Kearney normal, 14 to 10.

The Normals had them bested by far in straight foot ball. Halfback Hotchkiss got away repeatedly for good gains. Cotner was forced to punt often while the local team usually resorted to punts only as a ground gaining feature for themselves. Of seven forward passes, Cotner made two thirty-yard gains and a twenty-yard gain for a touchdown. Carrig, for the Normals carried the ball over for a touchdown, being the score and drop-kicked from the thirty-five-yard line in the first half.

It was but a few minutes before the close of the game that Cotner made the winning touchdown.

BADLY CRIPPLED TEAM TO MEET MORNINGSIDE

AMES, Ia., Nov. 1.—(Special.)—A badly crippled team will represent Ames in the Morningside contest Saturday. Captain Hart will probably not start, owing to an injured knee; Andrews, his substitute, is a capable player, however. Juhl and Crawford, the varsity guards, are taking daily workouts, but have not sufficiently recovered from fractures to be permitted to play. Wilson, who has been taking Juhl's place, was called home on account of the illness of his mother. Arington, another sub-guard, sprained an ankle and is out indefinitely. This means that Reeve, the regular right tackle, will have to start, in spite of a bad "charley horse." Moreover, Scott, sub-full, who has played in most of the games this year, has been called home on account of the death of his father. This loss has been partially compensated for in the return of Wood.

Against the crippled varsity, the scrubs have been having their own way. Uhl and Matteson have been especially effective in tearing up the varsity line, while Sless has been running ends and forward passing with great regularity. Coupled with this situation is the fact that Morningside has a strong team and has been rolling up big scores.

The probable Ames lineup will be: McDonald, left end; Pfund, left tackle; Cowan, left guard; Hunt, center; Thompson, right guard; Reeve, right tackle; Nagle, right end; Andrews, quarterback; Brennan, left halfback; Weyraeh, right halfback; Burge, fullback.

CRIPPLED, OMAHA CONFIDENT

Coach Mills Expects High School Squad to Defeat Lincoln.

INJURIES FORCE NEW LINEUP

Gould and Drummond still on Partially Disabled List—Lineup Leaves Them Out, Though They May Play.

In preparation for the biggest game of the season—that with Lincoln High school at Lincoln—the Omaha High school foot ball squad has been put through the most strenuous and careful practice by Coach Mills. Although the team has not recovered from the injuries to Gould and Drummond, Coach Mills regards the outcome of the game optimistically and believes the team will make a good showing against the capital city lads.

Numerous shifts will be seen in the lineup against Lincoln, several of the players being placed in easier positions so as to protect their injuries. At center will be Dick Baitman, who held down the pivot job last year. In Baitman's place at right tackle will be Arthur Smith, who has been playing guard since the first game. Carlson will play left tackle temporarily and will be switched back to his old place of fullback as soon as possible. Jack Sprague or James Durkee will take Carlson's position for tomorrow's game. Mark Hughes probably will fill the place left vacant by Gould on account of injury to his ankle.

This will be the first time in two years that the high school has journeyed to Lincoln and the Purple and White supporters will obtain a special for Saturday and go in a group to Lincoln. The special on the Rock Island will leave Omaha Saturday morning. At least 100 rooters will accompany the team to Lincoln.

This game probably will decide the state championship, as Omaha and Lincoln are the only likely contenders.

MIDSHIPMEN BEAT RESERVES

Officials Permit Game After Calling Off Today's Contest.

TOUCHDOWN IN SECOND PERIOD

Spectators Not Allowed to Cheer During Game Termined Unofficial, Applause Being Limited to Hand Clapping.

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Nov. 1.—After having called off the foot ball game scheduled to be played here tomorrow between Navy and Western Reserve of Cleveland, as a mark of respect to the memory of Vice President Sherman, the Naval academy authorities permitted a game to be played between the two teams this afternoon.

The game, which was won by the Midshipmen, by a score of 7 to 0, was an "unofficial" contest and the spectators were not permitted to cheer, encouragement of the teams being restricted to hand clapping.

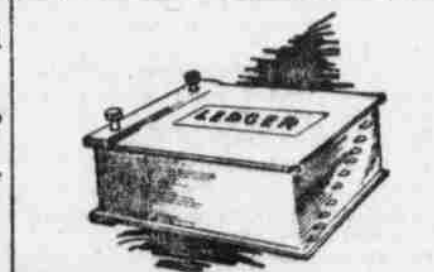
Pouring rain during the morning had soaked the field and showers during the contest added to the players' troubles by giving them a wet and slippery ball to handle.

Score in Second Period.

The only score was made in the second period, when after the teams had played each other to a standstill, the Navy coaches sent Captain Rhodes into the backfield for the first time this season. Replacing Nicholas at quarter, he immediately started old style line smashing tactics that the lighter visitors could not withstand. He soon hammered his way to the Reserve ten-yard line, whence he negotiated a pretty forward pass to H. Harrison, who was tackled just over the goal line. This touchdown with Brown's goal comprised the only scoring.

WEST POINT, N. Y., Nov. 1.—The foot ball game which was to have been played here tomorrow between the Army and Holy Cross has been cancelled. Orders were received from the secretary of war suspending all duties at this post tomorrow on account of the death of Vice President Sherman, and the foot ball game was called off.
