VOTING IN OMAHA IS HEAVY

At Some Polling Places Citizens Gather Hour Before Opening.

LONG BALLOT DELAYS VOTING

Much Scratching is Done, Though Many Get Weary and Cast Straight Party Votes in Ballot Box.

In spite of the terrific proportions of the official ballot the voting today was heavier in years. Word received at the offices of the various central committees throughout the day varied as to reports of heavy balloting in Omaha and Douglas county. At some of the polling places voters gathered an hour before the polls opened and waited patiently for an opportunity to tackle the herculean job of picking out the names of their favorites on eight feet of paper.

Many unregistered voters were waiting when the city clerk's office opened and were sworn in so they could cast a vote, having failed to register. The crowd, however, was not as large as on primary day, when the registration had not been so thorough and hundreds thronged into this office to be sworn in.

Five Minutes to Vote. Judges declare voters occupy an average of five minutes in voting. They go into a booth, look around for a chair, and finding none, lean against the scaffold side of the wall, adjust their glasses, move the candle nearer, pick up the three official ballots, dispose of the shorter ones first and then settle down to a study of the names of the men who want to save the country.

Much scratching occurred, although in a few wards the judges and clerks are sure the greater number of voters became disgusted and voted their tickets straight. They feel sure of this because the voters remained in the booths less than five minutes.

Mexican Rebels Destroy Railroad

EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 5.—Rebels today again destroyed the Mexican Northwest railway at various points below Juarez and dynamited two large trestles over a canyon west of the city of Chihuahua. Reconstruction of the road by the American company had been nearly completed on promise of federal military officials that the line would be protected.

COLUMBIA, S. C., Nov. 5.—In complete returns from seven counties give: Wilson, 2,785; Roosevelt, 236; Taft, 70. NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—The Evening Mail, one of the Roosevelt organs in this city, at 6:50 p. m. conceded the state to Wilson and claimed second place for Roosevelt.

VERMONT

WHITE RIVER JUNCTION, Vt., Nov. 5.—Returns for president in forty towns in Vermont out of 256 give: Roosevelt, 3,990; Taft, 2,781; Wilson, 1,618. Same places in September for governor gave: Metzer (P), 2,473; Fletcher (R), 3,067; Howe (D), 2,164.

IOWA

DES MOINES, Ia., Nov. 5.—Scattered estimates at 8 o'clock from six counties in Iowa indicated that Roosevelt had a slight lead.

FLORIDA

JACKSONVILLE, Nov. 5.—Although the vote is light and slow in reporting indications are that Woodrow Wilson will carry Florida by the usual democratic majority.

ALABAMA

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Nov. 5.—First seven precincts complete in Jefferson county give Wilson, 811; Taft, 37; Roosevelt, 1,471; Chaffin, 1; Debs, 58.

NORTH DAKOTA

GRAND FORKS, N. D., Nov. 5.—Twenty-two precincts in North Dakota give Taft, 569; Wilson, 82; Roosevelt, 62.

VERMONT

WHITE RIVER JUNCTION, Vt., Nov. 5.—Returns collected by the republican state committee show the result in eleven counties complete out of fourteen in Vermont as follows: Roosevelt, 17,751; Taft, 19,046; Wilson, 12,774.

OKLAHOMA

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 5.—The first three precincts in Oklahoma reporting give: Wilson, 138; Taft, 128; Roosevelt, 14. Seven of the ten republican electors are Roosevelt adherents. It has not been determined how they will vote should republicans carry the state.

Physician Wins Wife and Big Fee

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—A wife and \$7,478 was the reward gathered by Dr. Joseph E. Kavanagh for his attendance on John E. Herrell, a local financier who died in 1908. While physician to the capitalist he wooed and won the aged invalid's cousin and housekeeper, Miss Herrell. Now the courts have given him a verdict against the executors of the Herrell estate for the full amount of his bill for medicinal services. The district court of appeals, petitioned to reverse the finding of the lower court, has just refused to do so.

Babies Bought and Sold in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 5.—"Babies in Los Angeles are being given away, or bought and sold like so many puppy dogs," declared Dr. L. M. Powers, city health officer, today, who said new laws regulating the adoption or transfer of children were absolutely necessary. "It would be impossible to say how many babies vanish each year, leaving no clue to their fate. Many babies are taken for adoption by people who do not leave their correct identity and of whom we know find no trace. A few babies, of course, find good homes, but there are a great many whose fate is entirely different."
