LONG BALLOT DELAYS VOTING

Much, Scratching is Done, Though Many Get Wenry and Cast Straight Party Votes in Ballot Box.

In spite of the terrifying proportions of the official ballot the voting today was heaviest in years. Word received at the offices of the various central committees throughout the day verified earlier reports of heavy balloting in Omaha and Douglas county. At some of the polling places voters gathered an hour before the polls opened and waited patiently for an opportunity to tackle the herculean about two to one over the combined vote job of picking out the names of their favorites on eight feet of paper.

Many unregistered voters were walting hen the city clerk's office opened and were aworn in so they could cast a vote, having falled to register. The crowd, however, was not as large as on primary day, when the registration had not been so thorough and hundreds thronged into this office to be sworn in.

Five Minutes to Vote. Judges declare voters occupy an average of five minutes in voting. They go into a booth, look around for a chair, and finding none, lean against the softest side of the wall, adjust their glasses, move the candle nearer, pick up the three official ballots, dispose of the shorter ones first and then settle down to a study of the names of the men who want to save the country.

Much scratching occurred, although n a few wards the judges and clerks are sure the greater number of voters becaue disgusted and voted their tickets straight. They feel sure of this because the voters remained in the booths less than five minutes.

Undoubtedly the long ballot delayed the voting. In several precincts the rush for the booths became so earnest that the judges were compelled to distribute numbers to keep the enthusiastic citi zens in line. 
