British Attitude Explained. The British attitude in the Balkan situation is explained today in the House of Commons by Sir Edward Gray, the A large force of Servians has already foreign secretary, who was loudly cheered when in reply to a question, he said: "No one in view of the result of the war up to date will be disposed to dispute the rights of the Balkan states to formulate the terms on which they are

prepared to conclude peace. "Do not think that the great powers are ore slow than other people to adjust their known views to the march of vents. The powers are exchanging views regard to the position in the near east, but it must be a very delicate matter for them to interfere between two belligerents unless they do so at the request of both."

Asked whether Great Britain could not follow the precedent of Mr. Roosevelt in the Russo-Japanese war, Sir Edward Grey did not reply.

Sir Edward denied that Great Britain had given a warning of any kind to The movements of British Bulgaria. ships and their intentions he said, were precisely similar to those of the other powers, namely to protect lives. The steps had been taken as a result of communications which had passed between the powers.

Austrian Position Explained. VIENNA, Nov. 5 .- The attitude of the Austro-Hungarian government in regard to the proposal of Premier Poincare for the adjustment of the Balkan situation is clearly stated today in the Neue Freie Presse, which says:

"The present military situation in the Balkans cannot be decisive for the sofution of the whole eastern question. Premier Poincare gives to the Balkan states more than they have themselves de-

manded. "The proposal, which is a most radical expression of Pan-Slavist tendencies, is so one-sided that it can hardly find the approval of all the powers and particularly of Austria-Hungary, the less so as nothing is said regarding the future of Albania. This is a question which is of the greatest importance both to Austria-Hungary and Italy."

The anxiety of Austria-Hungary that Servia shall not occupy Albania, and thus secure that outlet on the Adriatic sea which the Servians are so desirous of, probably will provide a great bone of contention. Servia has been warned already from Vienna that her armies have gone far enough to the west. This warning is repeated today by the semi-official Fremdenblat. After praising the Servian soldiers for their humanity, the newsoaper says:

"The Servians having approached the frontier of a territory occupied without exception by Albanians it is hoped and expected now that Servin will avoid the raising of those difficulties which tha historic character of the Albanians make insurmountable. The most elementary ustice demands that the principle of 'the Balkans for the Balkan people' shall also be to the advantage of the Albanians." Prince Ghirka, the president of the Albanian national commission, it is said, is to be proclaimed king of Albania.

Austrian Fleet Sails Eastward. The first division of the Austria-Hun garian fleet consisting of the three battleships, one cruiser and two torpedo boat destroyers, left the naval station at Pola for the east last night. The exact destination is not known, but the comnander of the division has been ordered to report to the Austro-Hungarian ampessador at Constantinople, from whom he will ascertain where the vessels can best be employed.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5 .- Ambition to secome the moving picture magnate of the Pacific coast is alleged to have led Wallace J. Poland, until three weeks age cashier of the San Francisco office of the International Harvester company, to emexzle \$84,000 of his employer's money. Judge K. M. Greene, attorney for the International Harvester company, caused Poland's arrest today on the specific charge of having embezzled \$1,500 on October 3. Judge Greene said Poland had admitted this peculation and that admissions of other thefts brought the total up to

\$54,000. The peculations are alleged to have be gun early in 1911 and continued until early in October, when Aubrey E. Ambrose, traveling auditor for the company, arrived in San Francisco and began an investigation of Poland's accounts. Poland is held at the city prison in default of \$50,000 ball.


