**Two Fined for Insulting Women**—Seth Brown was fined \$5 and costs and Marshall Brown sentenced to thirty days in the county jail by Police Magistrate Foster for insulting women on the streets. Both men are colored.

**One Acre Sold**—The one-acre cemetery of the Society of Russian Israelites, formerly second and Brown streets has been sold to the Chevra B'nai Israel congregation. The deal has just been consummated. The price of the cemetery was not announced.

**Robert Carey Improving**—Robert, the 4-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. F. J. Carey, who was recently injured when he fell twenty feet to the ground from the rear porch of the Carey hotel, is improving rapidly at St. Joseph's hospital and will, in a few weeks, be out again.

**City is Warned**—A communication from the Omaha Auto Motor club was read before the city commission in which the association warns the council that the city will be held liable for damages to autos and auto drivers because of impaired condition of streets. No action was taken on the communication.

**Craig Goes to Dallas**—City Engineer George W. Craig will represent this city at the meeting of the American Society for Municipal Improvements in Dallas, Tex., November 13, 14 and 15. The city commission has chosen him as delegate. Mr. Craig is chairman of the paving committee of this association.

**Wabash Road is Backward**—The Wabash railroad is the only one among those indicted by the federal grand jury for discriminating in matter of freight rates that has not yet appeared before the United States attorney. The others have consulted the attorney and indicated that they would appear for a hearing at any time set.

**Water for Weeping Water**—At Weeping Water the Missouri Pacific officials have given the city council permission to connect the pumps with its artesian well. No lease has been entered into, but it is believed the arrangement will be made permanent. This gives the town an ample water supply for fire and domestic purposes and at practically no cost.

**Masten Returns to Vote**—John M. Masten, former superintendent of the fourteen division of the railway mail service, now located at Pittsburgh was in Omaha to vote. Mr. Masten has not yet been in Pennsylvania long enough to establish a residence there. He has recently been appointed superintendent of the Fifteenth division of the railway mail service at Pittsburgh.

**FIRST SESSION IN THE MORNING**

Nebraska State Teachers' Association Opens Big Meeting in Omaha with Program for Morning, Afternoon and Evening.

Omaha parochial schools will be closed today, Thursday and Friday that the sisters and instructors may attend the meeting of the Nebraska State Teachers' association.

At a meeting of the Catholic school board Manager Parish of the publicity bureau extended an invitation to the parochial school teachers to attend the convention and the invitation was immediately accepted.

E. L. Rouse of Peru, the president of the association, and A. E. Fisher, secretary, have arrived in Omaha and begun preparations for the registering of visiting teachers. An advance guard of several hundred is expected to arrive this afternoon and tonight.

After registering at the Hotel Rome they will secure their rooms at the hotels and from the rooming bureau at the Young Men's Christian association.

**First Session in Morning.**

The first session of the convention will be held at the high school auditorium this morning at 10 o'clock. As the central theme of the convention work will be economy and efficiency in education the first program will start with addresses by W. R. Pates of Alliance, S. H. Martin of Broken Bow and J. H. Beveridge of Council Bluffs on "Better Efficiency Made Possible by Some Needed Legislation," "Better Efficiency Made Possible by Raising the Educational Standards of Teachers" and "Better Efficiency in Commercial Department of High Schools," respectively.

The second session will be held at 2 o'clock in the afternoon at the high school and will contain an address on "Some Vital Relations in Education," by Dr. P. P. Claxton, United States commissioner of education, and a thesis, "Characteristics of Good Supervision," by Dr. F. M. McMurry, which will be followed by a round table discussion.

**Dr. Claxton to speak.**

The evening session of the first day will begin at 7:45 o'clock at the First Methodist church, when Mr. Claxton will again be the principal speaker, deliver-
