Dr. Claxton Stands for Equal Suffrage

"Though I am not tearing my shirt for it I always have believed in equal suffrage, and I believe that some day women in all states will have the right to vote," said Dr. Claxton at the home. "It is not coming all at once, but the history of progress shows that these things do come when they once get a good start. I do not think that suffrage will cure all evils, but it will do good. Its greatest effect will be to influence the home-keeping side of government. It will improve economic conditions in a large sense, making it possible to secure pure food and more sanitary conditions. The women are more interested in these things than the men, and they should have a hand in the voting. I do not see any good reason why any woman of intelligence and property should not have equal rights with men." Dr. Claxton is commissioner of the bureau of education at Washington. The bureau has been in existence for about fifty years and has done much toward improving methods of education. Special attention is paid by the bureau to give the rural schools what they deserve, as more than 50 per cent of the children of the United States live in the country. Employed in the bureau are experts in all branches of education. They travel at home and abroad to secure data and information, all of which is used to better the schools in this country. Dr. P. P. Claxton, United States commissioner of education, will be the guest of the University club at luncheon this noon, at which time he will speak on some phase of the subject of education. Dr. Claxton is a graduate of Johns Hopkins university and the University of Tennessee and has studied in different European countries, and now holds notable positions in the educational world. The luncheon will be for members only.

HULL SEEKING FOR PEACE

Makes Overtures to Representatives of McKee Side of Suit. COMPROMISE IS MOST DESIRABLE. Depositions Have Brought Out Some Startling Statements Which Neither Side is Anxious to Have Made Public.

Weakening under the relentless fire of questions of opposing counsel, C. W. Hull, head of the C. W. Hull company, who has been seeking to annul the divorce decree and \$20,000 alimony contract of his former wife, now the wife of William R. McKee, Jr., head of the McKee Motor Car company, made overtures of peace Monday afternoon.

McKee, Hull and attorneys on both sides spent most of today dickering over terms of settlement. The negotiations are being carried on in secret, and it was impossible for outside parties to learn what proposals were being made and how far apart the negotiators were.

Revelations of the contents of depositions which have come during the last few days have had much to do with bringing the Hull side to the point of proposing compromise. The McKee side always has been ready to talk settlement.

When both sides several months ago began taking depositions of witnesses in the case it became apparent that each desired to "feel out" the other and determine in advance of actual trial just how strong the other side was. Only with this purpose could many of the depositions have been taken. Depositions can be used in a trial only when the witnesses themselves cannot be produced.

Compromise Desirable.

The revelations of depositions on both sides, on both direct and cross-examinations, have been sufficient to make compromise appear more and more desirable to both Hull and the McKees. An additional reason for Hull's disposition to compromise and put an end to sensational disclosures is that he is contemplating matrimony. This has been an open secret for months. Some sensational depositions, whether they are true or not, have brought into the case names of half a dozen or more prominent and wealthy citizens. Whether the skeletons in the closets of these are genuine skeletons or merely have been created by imaginative deponents, these persons are not anxious to have them exhibited in open court. It is reported that persons who have experienced fears have urged Mr. Hull to give up the fight to break the contract to pay his former wife \$20,000 alimony.

Jail Breakers Meet With No Success

Arthur Rockefeller and John Schlusler are having no success in their efforts to break out of the new county jail. Yesterday the board of county commissioners ordered that the men must cease using hammers and chisels, as no jail can be proof against wreckers and it is unreasonable to suppose that prisoners could hammer down a section of steel grating without being detected. Since the men have been restricted to the use of back saws and drills they have made no headway. They can penetrate the soft steel covering the bars, but when they reach the chrome steel cores they are helpless.

Judgment Forces Man to Bankruptcy

Judgment against him for running into a man and injuring him with an automobile is the largest debt owed by Clair Wheeler of Millard, Neb., who has just filed a voluntary petition in bankruptcy in the federal court. Wheeler lists his assets at \$200, which represents household goods, and his debt at \$1,532.34. Over \$1,200 of the debt are the result of the judgment against him for injuring Henry Sorenson with an automobile he was driving. The judgment was rendered against him October 2, 1907, in the district court of Douglas county in the sum of \$249.50. The interest to date on this sum is \$201.40. He alleged that costs are due the clerk of the court for his services in the sum of \$22.39. Besides this there are witness fees that run the sum up to over \$1,300. Wheeler says he is a laborer.
