WOLGAST AND MANDOT EVEN

Divide Honors in Ten-Round, no Decision Bout. CHAMPION TAKES AGGRESSIVE New Orleans Pugilist Has Better of Four Rounds, Though Unable to Hold His Own in Close Range Fighting.

Wolgaat and Mandot fought a ten-round, no decision bout last night. Both took a lot of punishment, but at the end neither had the advantage, according to a decision of newspaper men. Although Mandot was accredited with having the better of four of ten rounds, Wolgaat with one, while the others were even, the champion's fighting and early aggressiveness won for him the unofficial draw decision.

Wolgaat lost no time early in the fight feeling out his new opponent. He seemed to try for a knockout in the first round. Mandot stopped the rushes and soon began fighting the champion in his own way.

Wolgaat clearly had the advantage in the infighting, Mandot at times appearing absolutely unable to fathom the champion's machine-like jabs when at close quarters.

Mandot played for the face and had Wolgaat's nose bleeding early in the fight. Wolgaat resorted principally to body blows. The attendance was about 7,500 and the receipts \$20,000.

Wolgaat landed heavy body blows and Mandot clinched. Mandot landed a hard left to body and missed a swing to the jaw. They clinched in center of the ring. The opinion of the fourth will not be known until this afternoon, but even should it be for Wolgaat, the three opinions already made public, counting the draw as a half vote, as is the custom, give the bout to the local boy.

Ed W. Smith of Chicago, who refereed the fight, said that Mandot had a "narrow escape" in the third round, that "he weathered the next rounds up to the sixth," that his clean work from that to the middle of the seventh evened the fight, and "that he undoubtedly had a clean shade during the last two rounds strong contender for Wolgaat's title."
