WOMAN GUILTY OF MURDER

Mrs. Louise Lindloff Convicted of Poisoning Son.

TWENTY-FIVE YEARS' SENTENCE

Crystal Gaser, After Collapse, Complains There is No Justice-Attorneys File Motion for New Trial.

CHICAGO, Nov. 5 -- Mrs. Louise Lindoff, spiritualist and crystal gazer, was found guilty of murder by a jury is Judge Winder' court tonight and her puntshement fixed at twenty-five years i the penitentiary. She was charged with the poisoning of her th-year-old son. Arthur.

Mrs. Lindloff laughed hysterically and cast a sneering glance at the jury when the verdict was read. Later she collapsed while standing in an ante room surrounded by her friends. She was revived and led back to her cell in the county Jall.

"There is no justice here," the convicted woman sobbed. "Those that are guilty are turned loose and those that are innocent got the worst of it. I will show my innocence before I am through It will only be a question of time. I did not kill my boy or any of the others. I am innocent, as God is my witness." A formal motion for a new trial was made by the woman's attorney and the court set November 15 as the date for

hearing arguments. One in Eight Convicted.

Mrs. Lindloff is the first woman convicted of murder in the Cook counts courts in three years. Seven other woman have been tried in the criminal court for murder, but In each case the jury either returned a verdict of not guilty or disngreed.

Other evidence was found and on June 17 the secress was indicted by the grand jury. The charge was murder and was based on the death of her son, Arthur,

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
