COUNTY TICKET WITH THE REST

Finished Before Late Today.

Election Phenomenal for Its Lack Excitement and for Small Interest Displayed Except in Marking of the Ballots.

With but little probability of the count of the ballots cast Tuesday in city and county being completed before late today enough returns were received before II o'clock last night to indicate that Wilson had carried the county, bearing to victory with him the greater part of the state and county democratic ticket. Thousands of republicans apparently voted for Wilson for the purpose of adding to the certainty of the defeat of Roosevelt. This was best indicated in the returns from one country precinct in Boomer township, where Taft only received four votes. Counts of the head of the tickets in thirteen precincts out of fullness 2.300; Taft. 70), and Roosevelt, 1,700.

The first precinct received was Minden, which gave Wilson 142 votes, Taft, fortythree; and Roosevelt, seventy-five. been that in the strong democratic districts of the state the disorder seemed about as bad as that in the republican districts, and there has been a disposition among the democrats to break away from party lines. The salogn issue has also come into the campaign in the later days as a disturbing factor, in an effort being made by the Personal Liberty league to line up for Dunn, the demo cratic candidate for governor.




