HILLES BLAMES ROOSEVELT

Says Defeat of Taft Rests on Shoulders of Colonel.

DESERTION CHANGES HISTORY

Republican Party Will Continue to Sustain Its Policies with Undiminished Confidence, Asserts National Chairman.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Responsibility for the defeat of President Taft "rests squarely and solely upon Mr. Roosevelt," said Charles D. Hilles, chairman of the republican national committee, in a statement issued after midnight. "But for Mr. Roosevelt's action in deserting the republican party," he said, "Mr. Taft would unquestionably have been elected."

"For the third time in fifty-two years the administration has been transferred from the republican to the democratic party. In each previous instance the republican party has been soon again recalled to power, for its policy, its history and its administration has been found the sanest and safest and the most conducive to the well being and prosperity of the people and the permanency of its institutions. So it will be in 1914.

"President Taft has served one term and has acquitted himself with credit to his country. His exceptional preparation for the task was universally commended. His administration was unqualifiedly endorsed by his party which again chose him for its candidate for a further term. The record of achievement during his administration was unparalleled. He was stood as a bulwark in support of the constitution and of representative government which is the very life of the nation.

"The government has been administered with fidelity and economy in every branch. The well-being of the American wage earners is unexampled. More men are employed today than at any time in the history of the country, wages are higher than ever before and prosperity abounds. All the conditions of triumphant victory exist.

"Revolt Causes Defeat. "The defection from the republican party accounts for today's results. The responsibility for this must rest squarely and solely upon Mr. Roosevelt. But for Mr. Roosevelt's action in deserting the republican party Mr. Taft would unquestionably have been re-elected. We would not be face to face with the inevitable transition of a national protective policy to the experiment of a tariff for revenue only.

"The republican party will pursue and sustain its policies with undiminished confidence. It will return to supremacy in 1914 with its policies fully vindicated—policies of reasonable protection to American industries and the independence of the judiciary.

"Out of all the conflict of this extraordinary campaign there can be drawn supreme consolation in which every citizen of the union must share—that throughout the uncompromising and unflinching warfare on President Taft and the republican party the third term attack upon our institutions has been defeated and the stamp of condemnation placed upon it by a large majority of the citizens of the country; and also that through his determined and vigorous exposure of the dangerous policy of the third term party he has repelled the assault upon the constitution of our fathers and upon the sound and basic elements of national life."

Dixon Gives His Opinion. United States Senator Dixon, chairman of the progressive national committee, gave out the following statement after midnight at progressive national headquarters:

"The election returns tonight show that more than 4,000,000 voters have enlisted under the banner of the progressive party. They have enlisted for the war. Some of our most enthusiastic leaders had hoped that possibly this might have been 1900. It is evidently 1900.

"The result of today's balloting makes the progressive party the dominant opponent of the democratic party. Today the old republican party becomes the 'third party' in American politics. The enlightenment of the voters of the nation has become an accomplished fact. We are going forward immediately with our plans to complete our organization for the congressional election two years from this time.

"I have issued a call for the progressive national committee to meet at Chicago on December 10. We have also invited to this meeting of the national committee all chairmen of the state committees, the progressive candidates for governor at yesterday's election and other prominent progressive leaders. We expect to maintain a permanent headquarters during the coming four years. The fight to drive special privilege from American politics has just begun."

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Nov. 6.—Congressman George Curry was fatally injured tonight near Alamogordo, Otero county, in an automobile accident.

President-Elect's Cousin Figures in an Omaha Election

Carl C. Wilson, second cousin of President-elect Woodrow Wilson, figured in an election which took place in Omaha today. Nominated as a member of the executive committee of the Real Estate exchange, Wilson modestly withdrew, just before the ballots were cast, and not until after the vote was counted was the exchange informed that he is a relative of the victor on the national election.

Byron R. Hastings was unanimously elected president of the exchange and Frank H. Myers, A. I. Creigh and E. M. Slater were made vice president, secretary and treasurer, respectively.

As members of the executive committee retiring President George T. Morton, P. D. Wead and C. C. George were elected on a plurality vote. C. C. Wilson, whose father, the late Dr. Wilson, a prominent Omaha dentist, was a cousin of President-elect Woodrow Wilson, was nominated for member of the executive committee, but on his own request that he be dropped because private business would interfere with his activity as an executive committeeman, his "strength" was thrown to the three who were elected.

A. I. Creigh as secretary of the exchange and E. M. Slater, treasurer, were unanimously re-elected with no competitive nominees.

At the conclusion of President Morton's short valedictory speech, the ex-officio voted its thanks to him and the other retiring officers for their services in the interest of the organization.

The new officers will take up their duties at the next meeting.

Berger is Defeated By Fusion Candidate

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 6.—Congressman Victor L. Berger of Milwaukee, the only socialist in congress, was defeated for re-election by former Congressman William H. Stafford, who ran as a fusion candidate on the democratic ticket.

SCHENECTADY, N. Y., Nov. 6.—The socialist strength in Schenectady, which was established here last year when Mayor George R. Lunn and a majority of aldermen and supervisors were elected, was broken at the polls today, when not a socialist candidate carried over the city.

The socialist ran second to the democrats and in the country precincts they ran third, with the democrats first and the republicans second. Debs received 3,466 votes in the county and Russell, for governor, 4,267. Mayor Lunn, candidate for congress, received 4,494 votes in the city, or 1,641 less than when he ran for mayor a year ago. Assemblyman Merrill, the only socialist in the New York legislature, was beaten by over 1,000 votes by Arthur P. Squire, democrat.

Babies Bought and Sold in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 6.—"Babies in Los Angeles are being given away, or bought and sold like so many puppy dogs," declared Dr. L. M. Powers, city health officer, today, who said new laws regulating the adoption or transfer of children were absolutely necessary. "It would be impossible to say how many babies vanish each year, leaving no clue to their fate. Many babies are taken for adoption by people who do not leave their correct identity and of whom we can find no trace. A few babies, of course, find good homes, but there are a great many whose fate is entirely different."

Election Officials Intimidate Voters?

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Nov. 6.—Andrew Berkeley, Theodore Swickard, Fred Towner and Joseph Jeffers were arrested at the voting place in Taylorville precinct today by deputy United States marshals and taken to Indianapolis. The men are charged with intimidating a citizen of the United States. The men had been released on bond and their arrest followed the petition of the bondsmen to withdraw. Berkeley, Towner and Jeffers were armed with revolvers when arrested. They were serving as election officials in the precinct.

Clark Re-elected to National House

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 6.—In the Ninth district Speaker Champ Clark, democrat, is re-elected to congress.

BOWLING GREEN, Mo., Nov. 6.—"I congratulate Wilson, and I congratulate the country," Champ Clark, speaker of the house of representatives, said at 10:30 o'clock tonight when told of Governor Wilson's victory. "No sensible man has doubted the result for weeks. I am not surprised at Roosevelt carrying Illinois, but am glad to hear that Judge Dunne was, probably, elected."

Bryan Rejoices at Victory of Wilson; Praises the Winner

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 6.—William J. Bryan made the first public expression of his pleasure at the election of Governor Wilson at the headquarters of the Woodrow Wilson State Progressive league in a local hotel here late tonight, when, in response to calls for a speech, he said:

"As a religious hymn has been brought into the campaign by one of the parties, I think that I am justified in using the lines of another hymn to express my feelings: 'This is the day I long have sought and mourned because I found it not.'

"I am happier than Governor Wilson, for his joy is repressed by a sense of responsibility, while I am happy and free. My confidence in Governor Wilson has grown with acquaintance and I feel sure that he will live up to the expectations which his campaign has excited.

"I have confidence in him because I believe he listens to his conscience. I have little faith in a man who does right only because he thinks that he is being watched. He must have a stronger motive than that. He must do right because he cannot live with himself unless he does.

"Mr. Wilson is free to be a people's president and I have no doubt that he will so conduct his administration as to command the approval of the country. My joy is increased by the fact that Nebraska, the city of Lincoln and the precinct in which I live all gave pluralities for Mr. Wilson."

Roosevelt Accepts Result, He Says, in a Contented Spirit

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., Nov. 6.—Shortly before midnight Colonel Roosevelt made the following statement:

"The American people by a great plurality have decided in favor of Mr. Wilson and the democratic party. Like all good citizens I accept the result with entire good humor and contentment. As for the progressive cause I can only repeat what I have already so many times said: 'The fate of the leader for the time being is of little consequence, but the cause itself must in the end triumph for its triumph is essential to the well being of the American people.'

At the same time he issued his statement Colonel Roosevelt sent the following telegram to Governor Wilson:

"The American people by a great plurality have conferred upon you the highest honor in their gift. I congratulate you thereon."

Mexican Rebels Destroy Railroad

EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 6.—Rebels today again destroyed the Mexican Northwestern railway at various points below Juarez and dynamited two large trestles over a canyon west of the city of Chihuahua. Reconstruction of the road by the American company had been nearly completed on promise of federal military officials that the line would be protected.

Judge's Feet Cut Off By Railroad Engine

ELGIN, Ill., Nov. 6.—While Judge Henry B. Willis, presiding jurist of the northern division of the appellate court, was standing on a railroad track in front of a newspaper office tonight watching the election returns, he was struck by an engine and both legs were cut off near the ankles. He also sustained serious injuries about the head.

RESTORE GOVERNMENT TO PEOPLE, SAYS MARSHALL

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 6.—Governor Thomas R. Marshall, democratic candidate for vice president, when assured of the success of the national ticket, said:

"The democratic victory of today will result in a restoration of representative government in America if democratic officials, both state and national, shall constantly remember that executive duty consists in the enforcement of the law and in the insistence upon legislative compliance with democratic platforms and principles; if legislative representatives will remember that they are to represent the people and not any interest whatever, and will be zealous to formulate into legislation the principles either enunciated in democratic platforms or growing out of the basic principles of Jeffersonian democracy; and if judicial representatives will give us perfection of reason in the light of today and not in the light of two centuries ago, and shall be content to construe, and not to make, statutory law."

WILSON LEARNS IS ELECTED

Future President Asserts a Great Cause Has Triumphed.

DINES WITH PARTY OF FRIENDS

First Returns Favorable to Him Fail to Make Him Overconfident, but Suspense is Very Brief.

PRINCETON, N. J., Nov. 5.—Responding to a telegram from the democratic national chairman, asserting that Governor Wilson unquestionably was elected, the governor sent a dispatch to Mr. McCombs as follows:

"I deeply appreciate your telegram and wish to extend to you and the members of the campaign committee my warm congratulations on the part you have played in the organization and conduct of a campaign fought out upon essential issues.

"A great cause has triumphed. Every democrat, every true progressive, of whatever alliance, must now lend his full force and enthusiasm to the fulfillment of the people's hope, the establishment of the people's right, so that justice and progress may go hand in hand."

This was Governor Wilson's first utterance of a public character following his acceptance of the reports that he had been elected.

At Banquet with Friends. Governor Wilson sat tonight with a party of friends around a brilliantly illuminated dinner table as the election returns began to come in, earlier than was anticipated. The first results the governor got were favorable and his comment was "that's very encouraging" as the returns continued to come in from Massachusetts, Connecticut and New York all favorable, Governor Wilson and the party about the dinner table showed their pleasure.

Captain Bill McDonald, the Texas ranger, who is the governor's body guard, read a stack of returns and felt so happy that he exclaimed:

"I wonder if I'd get arrested if I just shot off my guns. If it keeps up this way I'll have to just turn 'em loose."

Captain McDonald is a close friend of Colonel Roosevelt, but differs from him politically.

The governor was not overconfident. When shown the return from New York City he smiled: "I'm supposed to carry the city by three to one in order to win the state," he said as he continued his dinner leisurely.

NEW INTEROCEANIC RAILROAD FOR CANADA

MONTREAL, Canada, Nov. 6.—As the result of the entrance into Canada of a new and powerful group of English capitalists and continental bankers, Canada is sure of another interoceanic railway. It is announced in local financial circles today.

The proposed railway line when completed will extend from the Pacific ocean to Hudson bay and will be known as the Alberta, Peace River & Eastern railway. The Canadian representatives of the company have just received sanction from the railways commission for the first section of upward of 400 miles.
