The principal factor in the change was official figures from Clay county, which had been reported early as giving Taft 1,822; Roosevelt, 3,900, and Wilson, 2,616, a plurality for Roosevelt of 1,732. 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Items Will Double Present Capacity of Cracker Factory

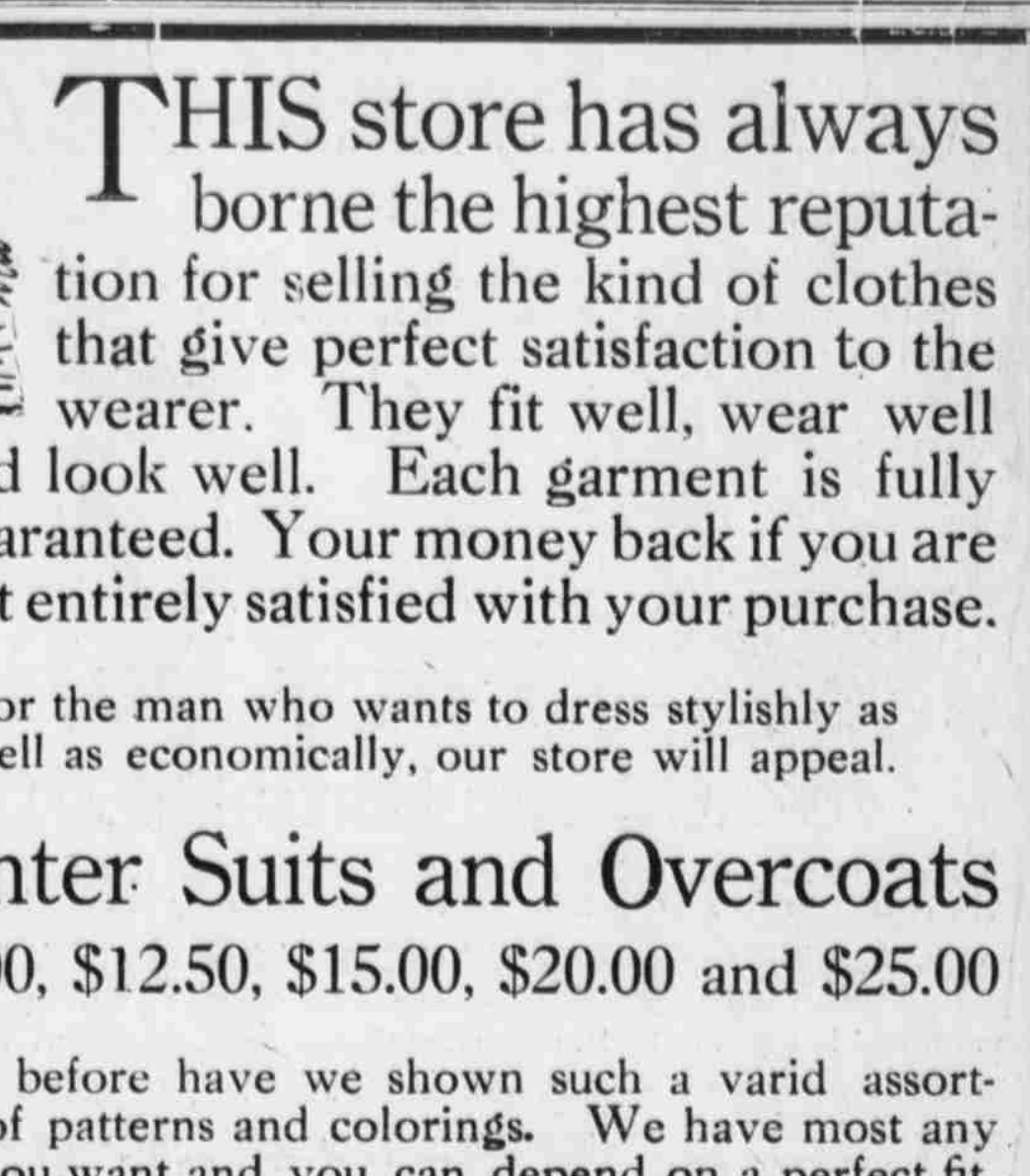
