nected with anarchists, but it is not known whether his crime was preconcerted or whather it was committed on als own initiative.

Political ferment always exists in Spain, but nothing has been reported within a recent pessod which could in any way be connected with the crime.

A strict censorship was instituted by the authorities on the telegraphs and telephones immediately after the committal of the crime and for several hours t was impossible to communicate with the outside world. Premier Canalejas was walking alone

Jose Canalejas y Mendes, prime minister of Spain, who was assassinated today, was selected to form the Spanish cabinet in February, 1910. He was leader of the monarchial democratic party, which came into power on the resignation of the liberal cabinet headed by Senor Moret y

Buffalo Overcoats to Be Sent to Posts in Alaska Territory

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12 - More than 4,000 buffalo overcoats which the govern ment has preserved for the last twenty years or since they were worn by the troops in the northwest Indian campaigns before 1891, are to be used by the soldiers in Alaska. Last year nearly 300 of the coats were sold at an average price of \$34, but Quartermaster General Aleshire the of the army, in his annual report submitted to Secretary of War Stimson today, recommended that no more be sold. General Aleshire reported an annual saving of about \$60,000 as a result of the change in the method of issuing blankets to enlisted men. Instead of being charged to the men on their clothing account, the blankets now remain the property of the government, being turned in when the men leave the service for cleaning and renovating. Through the same method General Aleshire figured there would be onsiderable saving in overcoat accounts. The report showed the average cost of counts for the army during the last fiscal year was \$144, ranging from \$125 for

It is explained by military experts that these two positions do not form part of the fortifications of the city of Adrianmiles outside of the advanced fort of Karagach. This latter fort was reported to have been taken by the Bulgarian troops some days ago, but since then the Turks have claimed a repulse of the Bulgarians. The two hills of Kartaltepe and Papaztepe, however, afford good starting points for an advance toward the line of fortifications
