SIX KILLED BY EXPLOSION Ton of Dynamite Set Off in Plant at Gary, Ind.

SHOCK IS FELT FOR MILES

Victims Were in Packing Plant Engaged in Repairing Machine. When Accident Occurred -No One Injured.

GARY, Ind., Nov. In-fix men were diled by an explosion of 2,000 pounds of dynamite in one of the packing houses at the plant of the Aetna Powder company near Gary, Ind.

The dead include William Halpin, forenan; Charles Schmidt, C. O. Carlson and three unidentified workmen. A number of workmen were reported to have been injured, but officials of the powder company said this was incorrect.

The men who lost their lives were repairing a packing machine when the explosion occurred. The dynamite was oose in 100-pound lots on the packing trays and but for this the accident would have been much more severe.

A South Shore interurban train was within a few hundred yards of the plant, but no one on the train was injured, although the shock broke windows in the town of Miller, a mile distant, The buildings are sunk in the ground, only the skylight being above the surface, and are widely separated. This arrangement of buildings prevented complete destruction


