Those who complain of high prices of meat will see the prices higher yet before spring." said John Findley. Lander, Wyo., in Omaha Tuesday. "The republicans, democrats or bull moose will not have anything to do with it, either. The live stock supply is simply not in the country. and for that reason meat of all kinds

will be scarce." Mr. Findley said the sheep run for this fail is about over, as practically all the sheep have been cleared out of Wyoming and the other sheep states. Very few range cattle, he said, are now left on the ranges, and he called attention to the fact that the hog crop is especially short

in the hog raising states. Sheep Business Dwindles. There will never be flocks of sheep Bankers are growing conservative because they are beginning to realize that there isn't as much range to pasture sheep as there used to be, and consequently the losses in winter are greater, It is harder now to get a bank to advance oney on a large flock of sheep. They learned something last winter when they found that after advancing money to carry the sheep, they had to advance larger sums to the ranchers to buy hay to keep the sheep through the winter. Hay was \$30 a ton, but the sheep had to have it because the range grass had been cropped too short in summer. Then

"But while the crop of sheep was short this year on account of the storms, I look MEAT PRICES TO GO HIGHER for even a smaller crop next spring. The bankers have crowded the sheep growers Wyoming Rancher Gives Interesting for money and forced them to sell everything that is saleable, forcing many of them to reduce the large flocks down to 1,500. Fifteen hundred ewes for a ranchman are not enough to restock the ranges, as you can't figure on more than 75 per cent as many lambs as ewes."

ST. PAUL, Minn., Nov. 11.-The Denver City Tramway company is entitled to the use of every street in Denver until 1926. according to a decision of the United States court of appeals handed down to-

The decision was filed in litigation of mortgagee of the tramway company, against the city and county of Denver. The trust company sought to have the franchise granted in 1885 made final in all its parts.

The court holds that under a special agreement ratified by the voters in 1906 the matter cannot be adjudicated until 1926 and that the present franchise is not permanent.

WOMAN DEFIES JUDGE KENESAW M. LANDIS


