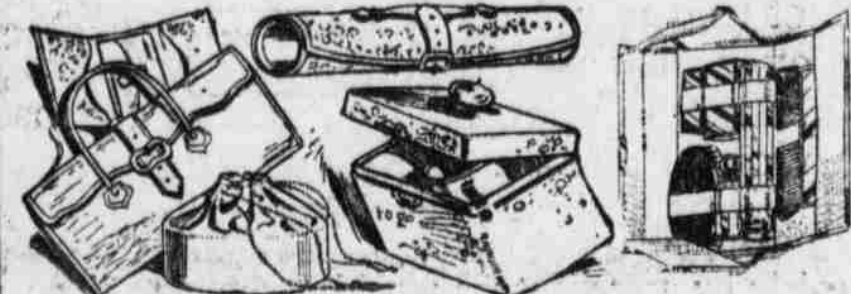

MAYOR LUNN SENT TO JAIL

Schenectady Socialist Arrested at Little Falls, N. Y.

REFUSES TO PAY A FINE

He Was Making Address to Striking Mill Workers When Police Interrupted Him—Denies Blocking Traffic.

LITTLE FALLS, N. Y., Nov. 15.—George R. Lunn, socialist mayor of Schenectady, was today found guilty of violating the city ordinance recently in refusing to move when the police interrupted a speech he was making to striking mill employes. He was sentenced to pay a fine of \$50 or spend fifty days in jail.

Mayor Lunn simplified his intention of going to jail rather than paying the fine, when he said:
 "This is a question of principle and I will never spend a dollar for quoting Abraham Lincoln."
 The mayor then made a brief speech, in which he said he wanted to appeal for his rights as a citizen.

"I was not blocking traffic or causing congestion," he asserted. "I was about to address a peaceful assembly. The prosecution is carrying on this case on a mere technicality and it is prejudicial."
 "I am going to urge the men to use peaceful methods in their strike. I did not resist arrest; I was seized and thrown into your jail."

Efforts will be made to obtain Mayor Lunn's release on bail pending an appeal.

DEMOCRATS OF WYMORE PLAN FOR RATIFICATION

WYMORE, Neb., Nov. 15.—(Special.)—Local democrats have announced plans for a Wilson-Marshall ratification to be held here Saturday afternoon. Barbecue and coffee will be served free to all. H. E. Fishbein of South Omaha

will give an address. There will be two bands. The day will close with fireworks and the burning of a bull moose and a r. o. p. elephant.

The local demand for cornhuskers is far greater than the supply. Corn is making about twenty-five to thirty bushels per acre, the yield being in most cases greater than expected. Recent rains have interfered with husking.

It is understood locally that the Lincoln Telephone and Telegraph company wants to sell its plant in Wymore. The Wymore Independent Telephone company has appointed a committee, which will go to Lincoln, on the 20th and make the Lincoln company an offer for the local plant. In case they cannot buy work of constructing a plant will be started at once.

George E. Peake of Savannah, Mo., will be engaged as consulting engineer and general manager of the plant.

Women Violate Law Against Gambling

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 14.—Women's card parties conducted under the name of clubs, not requiring a membership card nor a special invitation, were branded a violation of the gambling law by Judge Burney in the municipal court today.

The case in court was that of Mrs. Laura Setzer, charged with disturbing the peace following a quarrel with Mrs. Frances Thompson at a meeting of the progressive high five club at the home of Mrs. Constance Stewart, a teacher in China painting. The court room was filled with women. Witnesses testified variously that Mrs. Setzer gave Mrs. Thompson the first slap and vice versa.
 After Mrs. Thompson had administered a friendly but resounding slap upon the cheek of her attorney, George Birmingham, to attest to the severity of the blow she received, the court discharged the women with a reprimand.
 Testimony showed that the club often had met in a public hall, that 25 cents had been charged players, and that as

many as fifty women had taken part in the games for prizes.

Bulgarian Airships of Great Value in War with Turks

LONDON, Nov. 14.—The great value of aeroplanes in war has been proven by the Bulgarian army, not only in reconnaissance work, but for firing control.

That the murderous accuracy of the Bulgarian artillery was due, in a measure, to the activity of the airman is demonstrated in letters received from the front.

Any attempt by war correspondents to telegraph news of the employment of flying machines by the Bulgarians during the operations has met with very severe censorship, but stories are beginning to filter through showing that remarkably effective work has been done by the aeroplanes which passed through their baptism of fire in Tripoli.

Percival Phillips, special correspondent of the London Express, sends a picturesque description of the flight of a biplane over the Bulgarian army and the beleaguered city of Adrianople. He writes:

"The first long reconnaissance took place on the Tuesday following the occupation of Mustafa Pasha. A military biplane winged its way confidently toward the rising sun, making a wide detour above the troops, who were full of enthusiasm regarding this new and wonderful sight. Subsequently flights were made under excellent conditions, there being no wind.
 "From the little cockpit the trained observer with maps and glasses surveyed the wonderful panorama of war. Between Mustafa Pasha and Adrianople the country is a corrugated series of hills and valleys, effectively shutting off from us here any glimpse either of the enemy or of our first line. To the aerial scouts, however, these hills were no more than a row of insignificant ridges

cut by the broad valley of the winding Maritza, with a crooked yellow ribbon, the great Constantinople road, as the most pronounced landmark."

SIoux CITY, Ia., Nov. 14.—The Interstate Funeral Directors' association, which includes the states of Iowa, South Dakota, Minnesota and Nebraska, was organized here this afternoon. C. T. Westcott of Sioux City was elected president. The other officers named are:

Pursued by Mob, Killed by a Train

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., Nov. 14.—To escape harm by a mob James Cain, a wealthy young farmer, stepped in front of a fast Illinois Central train at Rantoul today and was killed.

Cain seriously wounded his 18-year-old sweetheart, Dorothy Lowery, here last night because she would not marry him. He hit her on the head with a hammer and fractured her skull.

The girl's relatives spread an alarm and a mob formed and pursued Cain through the country last night.

Vincent Astor of Age; Inherits Vast Riches

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—Vincent Astor, who tomorrow, his twenty-first birthday, comes into the fortune left him by his father, the late John Jacob Astor, was appointed today by Sheriff Julius Harburger to the third panel of the sheriff's jury. Young Astor thus takes his father's place on the "millionaire jury," comprised of some of this city's wealthiest men.
