

FORTUNE TO REMAIN INTACT

Flodman's Will Does Not Permit Estate to Be Divided.

MONEY IS GIVEN TO CHARITY

At the End of Fifteen Years the Estate is to Be Divided Among the Heirs Who Are Then Surviving.

The fortune of the late Peter E. Flodman, retired jeweler, estimated at \$50,000, must remain intact and unapportioned among the heirs for fifteen years by the terms of Flodman's will, filed for probate in county court. Only \$3,000, given to charity and sectarian schools, can be paid at once. At the end of fifteen years what remains of the fortune is to be apportioned among the children and grandchild of Flodman or their heirs.

Consumption of Cotton. WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Cotton consumed in the United States during October amounted to 51,253 running bales, according to the census bureau's monthly report based today. Cotton on hand October 31 was: In manufacturing establishments, 306,330 bales; in independent warehouses, 2,335,010 bales. Exports for the month were 1,315,741 bales and imports amounted to 10,579, equivalent in 20-pound bales. Cotton spindles operated during October numbered 30,918,572. Dry Goods Market. NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—DRY GOODS.—The cotton goods markets were steady, with trading general. Jobbers reported a good trade in silks and holiday novelties. Worsted yarns were very firm and cotton goods were up again. Underwear and hosiery values were tending higher.
