FORTUNE TO REMAIN INTACT

Flodman's Will Does Not Permit Estate to Be Divided.

MONEY IS GIVEN TO CHARITY

At the End of Fifteen Years the Estate is to Be Divided Among the Hetra Who Are Then Surviving.

The fortune of the late Peter E. Flodman, retired jeweler, estimated at \$50,000. must remain intact and unapportioned among the heirs for fifteen years by the terms of Flodman's will, filed for probate in county court. Only \$1,000, given to charity and sectatian schools, can be paid at once. At the end of fifteen years what remains of the fortune is to be apportioned among the children and grandchild of Flodman or their neirs.

Flodman, who was a candidate for district deputy assessor at the last general election. November s. dropped dead on election day.

The will directs the immediate payment of \$1,500 to the Immanuel Deaconess institute, \$500 to Luther college, Wahoo, Neb., and \$1,000 to Augustana college, Rock Island, Ill. Rev. Peter M. Lindberg and a son, Carl E. Flodman, as trustees." are to hold the remainder of the fortune intact for fifteen years. From the income they are directed to pay the widow whatever money is required for her support. If this does not require all the income, they are to pay a daughter, Berths, \$40 a month until she marries. At the end of the fifteen-year period all that remains of the estate and any accumulated income shall be divided share and share alike among the grandchild, Ralph Hypse, and the children, who are Mrs. Emma Thorson, Mrs. Ids C. Nordling, Mrs. Amanda Jacobson, Carl E. Flodman and Bertha Flodman. If any of these are dead at the time of the anportionment, their shares shall pass to their children.






