GOMPERS DEFENDS POLICIES

Says Movement in United States is Distinctively American.

VALUABLE RESULTS ACHIEVED

Recognition of Right of Tollers to the Best Alone Can End Struggle on Part of Labor.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Nov. 15 .- At the lose of a day of addresses by men from Great Britain and Canada and reprecentatives of religious and philanthropic associations organized in the interest of labor, President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor defended the nanpolitical policy of the federation and declared that the only thing that will end the struggle between capital and labor is recognition of the right of the toilers to the best of all that is pro-

"I may call attention to the fact that while we do not pin our faith to the pledges made by any political party, the American methods of our organized movement have accomplished results," said Mr. Gompers.

"While we are insistent upon the achievement of every demand of the labor movements we ought not to deny the achievement of some material results. I venture to make the statement that never were there so many people who voted for propositions, declarations, demands and promises for social justice as the 14,000,000 people who voted in this country two weeks ago.

"The American aspor movement is the product of American conditions. It is an outgrowth of American circumstances, a development of American industry and ommerce. Some may hold that to proclaim ultimate ideals without the means of attaining them is progress, while others may contend that every advance by the workers is progress and that every hour thrown off the shoulders of the workers each day means golden hours of opportunity for further progress.

Basis of Movement. "The basis of our movement, as I understand it, is that there is nothing on God's green earth that we created by our strength that we do not own, and we propose to continue in the struggle to bring every man and woman who tolls into the ranks of organized labor, and to instil Into him the idea that he is his brother's keeper. This American labor novement is not based on misery, not on hunger, except a hunger for more. Only the recognition of the right of the tollers to the best of all that is produced can end the struggle of the tollers of our

ade by John Seddon of England and Robert Smillie of Scotland, representing the British Trades Union congress, and John Bruce, representing the Canadian Trades and Labor congress. Conditions of workers under the British flag were described as no worse than those in the Inited States.

All three delegates declared that with slight differences conditions of laborers, the world over, were the same.

Congressman William Wilson of Pennsylvania defined the position taken by the labor group in congress, and told what had been done in the interest of bills for the limitation of the injunction in labor disputes.

"The labor group in congress," he said, has felt it necessary to guard against any infringement of the workers' political rights and to take steps by which the larger share of what is produced. The greatest battle in congress has been to destroy the one-man power that has arrogated to itself the power to issue injune tions in labor disputes. When relations between man and man come up for discussion the dispute belongs to the law courts and a trial by jury."
