### Tested Recipes

**Dutch Apple Pie.**  
Line a pie plate with a good, rich crust. Halve the apples, place on crust, with inside down, sprinkle with sugar, nutmeg and cinnamon and bake until apples are tender. Serve hot.

**Green Pepper Salad.**  
Remove the seeds and veins from one green pepper, parboil five minutes in boiling water salted. Cool, cut into strips, mix with one-half shredded lettuce, and pour over a French dressing made by mixing one-half teaspoonful of salt, four tablespoonfuls of oil, two tablespoonfuls of vinegar and stir until blended.

**Pork Chops, Southern Style.**  
Fry four pork chops until brown. Slice three medium sized onions and spread over chops in the same spider in which they were cooked, and season with pepper and salt. Cook chops with boiling water, place cover on spider and simmer for one hour. When rightly cooked they taste like chicken.

**Potato Rolls.**  
Take well mashed potatoes and add salt, pepper and butter and a little milk. Add one well beaten egg to every six potatoes. Make into rolls, cover with flour and fry brown in butter.

**Fried Tomatoes.**  
Cut firm, ripe tomatoes into thick slices, season with salt and pepper and dip into a well beaten egg, fry brown on both sides in a little butter and lard; serve plain or with a cream sauce.

**Pepper Salad.**  
Please try this and report. We think it is fine. Remove seeds and core from three green peppers, slice as thin as possible; also slice two Bermuda onion. Add one cucumber sliced, add one cupful of celery cut in dice, shape and serve with salad dressing.

**Tomato and Tapioca Soup.**  
A can of tomatoes, run through sieve; a 10-cent can of beef tea; a cup of pearl tapioca, soaked two hours in a little cold water; two teaspoonfuls of onion juice; a teaspoonful of white sugar; a tablespoonful of salt; a teaspoonful of chopped sweet herbs, and paprika to taste. Put ingredients over the fire (leaving out the tapioca) to heat, and bring slowly to the boil. Keep this up for five minutes and stir in the soaked tapioca. Simmer five minutes more and serve. Any good stock you happen to have may be substituted for the canned soup to flavor the above.

**Sweet Tomato Pickle.**  
One peck of salt water, every let stand overnight and in the morning drain off; then take four quarts of vinegar, three pounds of brown sugar, quarter of a pound whole white mustard seed, two tablespoonfuls each of pimento, cloves, cassia, ginger and ground mustard, one teaspoonful of cayenne pepper. Put all in a kettle and boil until thoroughly done. This will keep in a stone jar.

**Rice Muffins.**  
Into a mixing bowl sift two cupfuls of flour with four teaspoonfuls of baking powder and one-half teaspoonful salt. Add and thoroughly blend one cupful of cold boiled rice. Beat one egg light and

## SUGAR PRICES ARE DECLINING

Is Now Retailing in Omaha Twenty Pounds for a Dollar.

## BOTH BUTTER AND EGGS ARE UP

Cabbages Are Cheaper and English Walnuts Scarce—Older Planting—Retail Price of Potatoes Unchanged.

Sugar is still on the decline, now selling at twenty pounds for a dollar, and it is expected to go still lower. The warehouses are full with an overproduction and retailers are anticipating a price of \$4.25 a sack, while getting it now for \$5.

Butter and eggs went up during the week. Butter advanced a penny and is priced today at 26 cents a pound retail. Butterine made by various manufacturers can be made to sell at the same price if the housewife cares to economize so. Those who know say that the best butterine can be had for 25 cents a pound and is of a kind that scarcely can be distinguished from real creamery butter.

Fresh vegetables on the local market are all imported. Beets, carrots, onions and radishes from Louisiana are priced at 5 cents a bunch. Tomatoes are selling at 2 1/2 cents a pound. Cabbage has taken a pound, which represents a decline of 2 1/2 cents. Squashes are marked at 1 cent a pound.

Canned tomatoes are higher this season owing to the shortage of crop near the big canneries. Other canned goods are reasonable. English walnuts are very scarce this fall; only half of the orders can be filled, and they are selling at 30 cents a pound. Winter is priced at 25 cents a gallon.

The wholesale price of potatoes has risen, although the retail price is held at 20 cents a bushel. Sweet potatoes may be bought at three pounds for a dime.

## Police Must Learn How to Handle Guns

Since the startling discovery made by Chief of Police Dunn that several members of the department are unable to hit a brick wall at the distance of ten feet with a cannon, orders have been issued making it compulsory for the "coppers" to take use of the target gallery in the gymnasium at the station.

Even Policewoman Drummy must become accustomed to the clammy feeling caused by the cold steel on the handle of the gun.

When asked by a reporter to display the deadly weapon she opened her handbag and brought to sight a flimsy, cute little powder rag. Superintendent Ryder has instructed her to carry an "honest-to-goodness" revolver and to practice shooting at the target at the jail.

Chief Dunn says all women should know how to handle a gun, so that when burglars attempt to rob their homes they may be able to rout the intruders. Mrs. Drummy is out a great deal tonight and the chief believes it necessary that she know how to use a gun should occasion arise.

## Teamsters Victors in Chicago Strike

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—For a few hours today about 3,000 teamsters were on strike in Chicago and it was feared that the trouble might extend to 24,000 more and assume serious aspects.

Tonight, however, the employers of the striking men granted all of their demands—\$1.50 a week increase for double teams and \$1 for singles, and 30 cents an hour for overtime. The men will return to work tomorrow.

## TELEGRAPHS HE IS DEAD IN EFFORT TO BECOME LOST

GRAND ISLAND, Neb., Nov. 15.—(Special)—It did not take very long after the telegraph wires between this city and Altoona, Pa., began to talk to clear up the supposed murder mystery of a few days since—a mystery occasioned by telegraphic inquiry by the Altoona police for details of the accidental death of Jacob Heintz of that city at or near Grand Island.

When the Altoona papers were received here chronicling the pure fiction that prominent local officials had telegraphed to Altoona relatives of the dead man information was exchanged between the papers of Altoona and Grand Island and the next day the supposedly dead man was taken into custody by the Grand Island police chief.

It was obviously an effort on the part of Heintz himself to become lost to his family on account of domestic differences. Heintz has been working in the Union Pacific shops here and was himself responsible for the sending of the fake telegrams. No charges having been preferred by eastern parties he has since been released.

Persistent Advertising is the Road to Big Returns.

## New Yorker Declares Paper Advertising is the Best of All

The confinement of advertising to two mediums, newspapers and street car, was dwelt upon by Fred H. Linder of New York, secretary of the National Dry Goods Association, in an address at the monthly meeting of the Omaha Retailers' association at the Paxton hotel last night.

Mr. Linder's address was along the lines of the value received from retailers' organizations. He told of the workings of the various retail organizations throughout the country. He divided his subject into several parts, among which was that of advertising. He said that in many of the cities of the country the retailers have absolutely refused to allow advertising solicitors other than members of the newspaper profession and street car ad men in their stores.

He had with him a card which is used in some towns and which is hung on the door of the store. It prohibits advertising solicitors, donation seekers and agents to see the advertising manager of the store until he has explained his scheme or plan to the secretary of the association, who will take the matter before a committee.

If the committee finds it favorable, a card will be issued the solicitor which will give him access to the stores. He is classed as newspaper advertising daily and weekly publications.

J. D. Butler, secretary of the Omaha Credit Men's association, was the only other speaker of the evening. He told of the work being done by that organization and methods they use in educating the buyers to pay their bills when due and not let them run over thirty and sixty days past due. He explained the manner in which bills are handled and collected.

In the business meeting the association voted to open their stores evenings but one week before Christmas. The retail stores will be open evenings beginning Wednesday, December 18, and remain open evenings including Wednesday, December 24.

A committee will be appointed to cooperate with a committee of the Commercial club looking toward a campaign for early buying.

## Million Dollar Bond Goes to Lion Company

The \$1,000,000 official bond of State Treasurer Walter A. George, just rejected, is to be placed through the Lion Bonding and Surety company of Omaha, which will be the principal surety. This is the biggest official bond in the state, and in placing it, a Nebraska company is thus given the preference, although, of course, it will be underwritten with many other companies. The premium on the bond is paid by the state, and at current rates amounts to \$3,000 for the two years.

## MOVING PICTURES TO BE MADE OF AMES-IOWA GAME

IOWA CITY, Ia., Nov. 15.—(Special)—Moving pictures of the state championship football game between Iowa and Ames, which is to be played at State Field, Ames, Ia., next Saturday afternoon, are to be taken by the university management, according to an announcement here today that all plans had been perfected. This is the first time moving pictures of a football game have been taken in Iowa.
