The drive will probably later be lined on the west side with small stores and fancy shops, while the Miliard property which extends from the drive to Twenty-fourth street is being considered as a site for a new \$1,000,000

C. F. Harrison, who is a member of the city planning committee of the Omaha Real Estate exchange, has been endeavoring for some time to bring about the widening of Twenty-fourth street. He says that such a project will sooner of later have to be carried out by the city and that now is the time it should be
