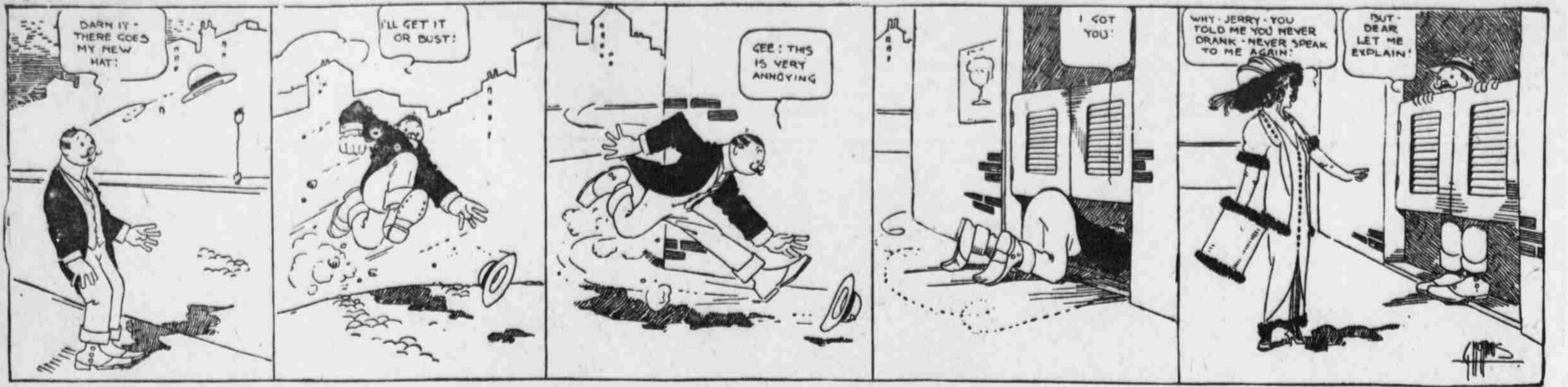

Tamiasa Drop Kicks.

Tamiasa worked a fake for thirty yards, while S. Levey followed with a similar number, carrying the ball to Tarkio's three-yard line. At this point Creighton lost fifteen yards for pushing. 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did Minnesota's attack prove so dangerous that it threatened the Badger goal. Scoring the ball on their own twenty-yard line, when Gillette's try for a field goal from the fifteen-yard line had failed. Minnesota started a steady march down the field, Hayward using the shift principally and working McAlmon hard. On Wisconsin's ten-yard line, however, the Cardinal line held for two downs, and then the timekeeper's whistle announced the end of the game.

The Game in Detail. At five minutes of 2 Minnesota's team flashed upon the field amidst a storm of cheers. Herman was at right half, Sotton at left tackle, and Fournier at left end. Ten minutes later Wisconsin appeared upon the field to the strains of "Wagon Wheel." Van Ripper led at left half. Wisconsin won the toss and chose to defend the west goal. There was a slight wind blowing from the west.

Solemn kicked for Minnesota to the twenty-yard line and Bright ran the ball back ten yards. In two downs Wisconsin failed to gain. Van Ripper failed to gain and Wisconsin was penalized fifteen yards for holding. Gillette kicked to the twenty-five-yard line, and Gillette again kicked to Minnesota's twenty-five-yard line.

A forward pass, McAlmon to Aldworth, gained eight more. Shaughnessy kicked to Wisconsin's twenty-five-yard line, the ball coming in at the forty. Two smashes gained Wisconsin's ten-yard line. HUSKERS SNEAK UP FROM BEHIND AND WIN OVER KANSAS

When even the most ardent supporters of Stiehm's eleven were ready to give up, the spectre of defeat, took the ball and romped seventy yards for the points that settled victory.

Missouri Valley Record.

By this winning the Cornhuskers have a clean slate in the Missouri Valley conference games for the fall and look like the class of this division, though they did not add a bit of credit to their record through the victory today. The score however, the thing that counts in any game, favors Nebraska. The Jayhawkers did mighty fine work. They had a lighter team, yet their line played that of the Cornhuskers more than even, and but for the center trio of the Nebraska front would have decisively whipped their opposing linemen.

Make Splendid Showing.

The Jayhawkers made a splendid showing when the Cornhuskers were on the offense. The Nebraska could not get their plays off with any degree of success for this reason. The Jayhawkers would get through, sometimes breaking up a play before it was started, and very often hurrying the players so much that no headway could be gained. The favorite of Stiehm's tricks did not work when they were expected to do so. Purdy whom the Jayhawkers had been taught to fear, was kept from getting away with any of his spectacular work because he was constantly watched. He did, however, make some good gains through the line.

Neither eleven used the forward pass with any great success.

Kansas made one good gain with this play and permitted Nebraska to make a touchdown when trying to gain with it in the final quarter. The Cornhuskers went into the game confident of winning. They had not expected to be held for many downs by the Jayhawkers forwards. The Kansas line had been taught to stop the very plays that had gained for Nebraska in the previous contest, showing that the play of the Cornhuskers had been closely watched in all important games. The trick by which Nebraska registered its touchdown against Missouri, two weeks ago, was attempted today and it failed, not even gaining a foot.

Fortunate to Win.

Fair expression on the game will say that the Cornhuskers were fortunate to win the contest. The manner in which the fighting Jayhawkers stuck to the fight and waged the battle, keeping Nebraska on the defensive most of the time, entitles the Lawrence players to much credit, and though they went away from Lincoln tonight beaten, still they carried off some of the honors. The fight they put up only adds glory to the traditional manner in which they fight the Cornhuskers. No matter how often they have been licked (they were defeated three times this year), they always go into the Nebraska game and battle hard. Usually they make the game close, as they did today.

Probably most credit for the victory of the Cornhuskers today must go to the Nebraska backfield.

In this respect he was really the best player on the field. Captain Ernie Frank did some very fine work. Allan, at center, played by far the best game of the season, for him. Early in the fall he did not do very well. He showed his first fine work in the Missouri game. Today, however, he was a star. He outplayed his opponent. He was into many plays of the Kansas offense.

Kansas Has Several Stars.

Widline (because he kicked the goal), Price, Holliday, Wilson and Brownlee must have credit for holding up the Kansas side of the game. They played brilliant ball. The ends, Price and Brownlee, were nearly always able to check advances though it was Price's end that weakened when Frank made his long run. The pass, which was intercepted by Howard, was shot toward Turdor, who would have had a clear field for a long gain had he caught the oval. The fact that Howard made away for long run, is no discredit to Turdor, and he is in no way to blame for this error. He was too far away to overtake the fleet Corn-
