SCHOOL AND COLLEGE WORK

Drift of College Graduates to the Different Professions. TEACHING FORGES TO THE FRONT Business, Law and Medicine Surpass the Ministry—Activities of State Normal Schools and Others. What becomes of college graduates? The question is propounded and answered by William B. Bailey, Ph. D., assistant professor in economics at Yale university, in the current issue of the New York Independent. The answer follows: To the United States bureau of education we are indebted for a study covering the occupations of our college graduates from 1812 to 1900. Statistics of thirty-seven colleges and universities furnished this material. Taking three periods a century apart, we have the following percentages: 1812-1830 1830-1850 1850-1870 Ministry 35.5 21.4 5.9 Law 1.6 96.5 15.2 Medicine 2.1 8.4 6.2 Education 4.7 5.7 30.7 Business 1.6 5.6 18.8 Public service 2.1 1.1 1.9 At the close of the eighteenth century the ministry overshadowed all other professions and was chosen by about two-thirds of all the graduates. One hundred years later only about one-fifth of the graduates adopted this profession. At the close of the nineteenth century less than 5 per cent entered the ministry. Education, which was selected by only a comparatively small number down to 1830, has advanced with great rapidity until now it outranks all other professions and is chosen by over one-fourth of the graduates. Law, at the end of the eighteenth century, was the profession of nearly one-third of all graduates and outranked all other professions at this time. Since then it has lost its relative importance, although the actual number of graduates entering this field has increased. Business claims an increasing proportion of graduates, until at present nearly one-fifth enter an active business career. Less than 1 per cent of the graduates of these thirty-seven colleges now enter agriculture. A century ago the proportion was between three and four times as great. KEARNEY STATE NORMAL. Shotgun Review Exposes Defects in Educational Armory. At assembly Wednesday, President Thomas gave a "Shotgun Review" covering questions of current interest as a means of testing the general information of the student body. The questions embraced the number of states in the union, the American ambassador to the court of St. James, the present ruler of England, approximate cost of the Panama canal, the triple alliance and the triple entente, who painted the "Sistine Madonna," the author of "The Shepherd of the Hills," who won the world's baseball series, the university of which Woodrow Wilson was president, etc. The test showed a general knowledge of these subjects, but indicated a meager understanding of the European situation at the present time. The Department of Agriculture has completed the harvest of its best crop.
